Five Children Burned To Death In Alberta Fire

GUNN, Alta. (CP)—Five children were burned to death Tuesday when fire destroyed their one-room cabin near this community about 40 miles northwest of Edmonton. The mother is in serious condition in hospital.

Dead are the children of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Kelsey. They were identified by police as Ernest, 8, Viona, 6, Marilyn, 5, Wayne, 4, and Lawrence Jr., 2.

The victim's father is an oil worker in the Drayton Valley, about 80 miles southwest of Edmonton. He was not at home at the time.

Police said the mother ran naked half a mile for help after being unable to extinguish the flames. She was badly burned when she arrived at the home of Elke, a neighbor, from where she was taken to hospital in Edmonton.

The family had lived in the home for the last two years. Details of how the fire started were not immediately available.

all the students it can get. "I know it is training all it can get, but it is not getting nearly enough."

Mr. Large criticized the quality of the teachers being turned out by the Provincial Normal School. He said that according to a report issued by Dr. Frank MacKinnon: Out of 58 students in teacher training, 23 entered without previous training while 35 entered with unimpressive records. "These are the kind of students we are training to go out and teach our youth," said Mr. Large.

The First Queens member said there was a steady growth in the number of convent senior high schools in the Province. He said five out of ten of these schools were staffed wholly or in part by Roman Catholic nuns. He said there were now 12 public schools staffed by nuns and the total number of R.C. sisters teaching in the

years. He said other services had increased tenfold while education only increased four fold. "I think when the day of reckoning comes those who have short changed our teachers will have to answer for it," he said.

"The Premier thinks a Royal Commission would be of little value," said Dr. Dewar. "It is possible that if we did have a genuine royal commission it might bring in some worthwhile recommendations. If on the other hand a royal commission cannot bring in anything worthwhile, how will a committee of the House do it?"

There were many members of this House who know great deal about education," said the speaker. "It is not just a few pressure groups that have asked for this royal commission. I do not believe anyone should take unto himself absolute power. I have heard stories of friction, discord and frustration and I am led to believe that all is not well in educational circles," he said.

He advocated the investigation of supplements and felt that these should be standardized. "A certain supplement for a certain class of teacher. Why should a district with a whole lot of vacant farms be required to raise as much taxes as the more thickly populated district."

Continuing Dr. Dewar advocated: A common level for teacher's pay; increased differential and a certification board.

Dr. Dewar noted that in Saskatchewan they raised the teacher standard to two years of normal training and more teachers came into the profession. "Here it is the opposite, we lower the standard, we get fewer teachers," he said.
