

Accidental Death Is Jury's Verdict

A verdict of accidental death was handed down last night at a coroner's inquest held at City Hall to determine the cause of the death of Ronald L. MacDonald, 29, of Charlottetown.

The verdict reached stated that "Ronald L. MacDonald met his death as a result of injuries received in an accident, when the car he was driving left the highway at Cherry Valley at approximately 6.30 p.m. on April 18, 1959."

The verdict also stated that death occurred in the Prince Edward Island Hospital at approximately 9.30 p.m. on the same date, and that the cause of the accident was unknown.

Provincial Pathologist, Dr. John C. Craig said that death resulted from injuries received to the chest and lungs.
