# Two Face Charge Of Store Break

**SUMMERSIDE** — Two young Summerside men were charged separately in police court yesterday with breaking into Robert Fraser's shoe repair shop on the corner Thursday where they were caught by police officers Stewart Berry and Blair Buel. The pair, Ivan Arsenault and George Gallant, both 20, elected trial by judge and jury and their cases were adjourned for preliminary hearing until Aug. 1.

Crisis, Berry and Buel went to Fraser's repair shop as the result of a phone call around 12:30 a.m. after two men had been seen entering the building. Stanford MacDougal of Summerside pleaded not guilty to a charge of forging a cheque and the case was adjourned for hearing until July 31 at the request of defence counsel G. Bruce MacDonald.

A charge of vagrancy against Diadonna Fournier of Summerside was dismissed after evidence was completed yesterday. Fournier was arrested by Consts. Berry and Gordon Gray around 3:30 Tuesday morning on Russell street after he failed to give them what the felt was a reasonable explanation for walking around the streets at that hour of the morning.

In Thursday's account of the police court news, Wendell Ford was erroneously reported as having pleaded guilty to a charge of assaulting his mother-in-law by striking her with his fist. The accused pleaded not guilty. His case was further adjourned yesterday until Aug. 1.

**SENIORS' HOUSING, WEST POINT FERRY, TOURISM ARE DISCUSSED**

**O'LEARY** — A large and enthusiastic audience at O'Leary last evening heard a report of the senior citizens' homes program in the province and was told that a survey just completed in the West Point area will be built in the O'Leary area.

The first units to be explained were the plans for the new homes to be built in the Souris and Tignish districts.

Hartwell Daley, Charlottetown director of research, presided at the meeting and also reported on the development of a beach park at West Point and the proposed West Point — N.B. ferry.

Mr. Daley also introduced Hon. J. David Stewart, minister on tourism and the importance of communicating to tourists the need to spread out into eastern and western sections of the province instead of concentrating in the centre portion.

He also explained the government's handicraft development program and suggested that a committee be formed in the community to take advantage of the plan. He urged that such a committee or representatives meet with Dr. Ivan Crowell, director of handicrafts in New Brunswick when he returns to the province in the fall, to help launch the program.

Cape Horn at the southern tip of South America was so named after the vessel in which William Schouten rounded the Cape in 1616.

Close to 1,000 tons of steel piling for the Wood Islands wharf and breakwater improvement project are being unloaded at the Railway Wharf, Charlottetown.

The steel fabricated in the United Kingdom, arrived here on board the Irish bounding freighter, MV Irish Rose. Local agents for the ship are Buntin and Bell Ltd.

Once the steel is landed on the wharf, a huge mobile crane is loading it on large trailer trucks for transport by road to Wood Islands.

Other activity on the Charlottetown wharf yesterday, in addition to two Irving Oil Co. coastal tankers taking on cargo for delivery to smaller oiling stations, was the loading of the MV North Gaspé.

The Gaspé took on close to 150 tons of assorted island produce, fresh, frozen and cooked meats for delivery to smaller oiling stations.

The North Gaspé sailed last evening for the Magdalen Islands.

**High Prosperity, Employment May Give Way To Hard Times**

STOCKHOLM (AP) — High prosperity and full employment are what one finds in Sweden today.

But there is creeping inflation, too, and the nation is gripped by fear that the good time it has enjoyed since the Second World War may be replaced by a hard fight for economic survival.

For prosperous Sweden faces the prospect that it may be isolated from the booming European community developing from the Common Market.

What will happen if this nation of 7,500,000 is excluded from the six-nation European Market which may eventually embrace Britain as a sixth country?

Sweden, like neutral Austria and Switzerland, is seeking association with the Common Market. But there is opposition, because these countries are politically neutral. There is some concern in West Europe that any such association would dilute the political aspects of the Treaty of Rome, the charter of the Common Market.

**CANNOT HAVE BOTH**

Some West European leaders insist the neutrals cannot have it both ways. They cannot benefit from economic integration without accepting the drastic limitations accepted by the other Common Market partners to sovereignty in commerce.

So the outlook for these neutrals to win associate membership in the Common Market is doubtful. And Sweden thus faces the prospect of isolation from the economic community that may one day embrace close to 300,000,000 persons.

A flourishing foreign trade is vital to Sweden. In proportion to population, Sweden's exchange of goods with other countries is among the world's highest. Sweden must maintain or improve its competitive po-

**WILL SEEK CONNECTION**

Sweden will pursue the quest for associate membership in the growing West European trade bloc. But all political parties agree this country will not apply for full membership involving acceptance of political obligations.

Sweden, a neutral since 1813, considers its neutrality the bulwark of peace and political balance in the Nordic area. There is no doubt that the Swedes, if they must choose between the Common Market and neutrality, will take neutrality and with it an economic isolation.

If this happens, one astute observer predicts: "Sweden will become more and more leftist in its domestic policies if a hard fight for economic survival develops outside the Common Market. Big government will become bigger. Huge public works projects probably will become necessary to sustain employment."

**More Butter Disappears**

**OTTAWA (CP)** — More butter and milk disappeared from stocks in May than a year earlier, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported Wednesday.

But the stocks themselves, totalling 190,800,000 pounds in creamery butter and oil on June 1, were higher by 61,300,000 pounds than a year earlier.

Domestic disappearance in May totalled 33,100,000 pounds or 360,000 metric tons in May, 1961. Part of this is attributed to the implementation on May 1 of a 12-cent-a-pound reduction in the price to the consumer.
