**DEBATE IN
IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT**

Over Situation in the Far East.

SIR CHARLES DILKE ATTACKS THE GOVERNMENT.

And is Replied to by the Leader, Mr. Balfour.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Aug. 11.—During a debate on the Appropriation Bill, in the House of Commons, Sir Charles Dilke, Radical, opened an attack on the Government's foreign policy, especially in the far east. The Liberal leader in the House, Sir Wm Harcourt, followed in the same strain. The Government leader, Mr. Balfour, replying to the last speaker, said: "We must treat Germany as we expect her to treat us."

Referring to Russia, Mr. Balfour said he saw no necessity for taking a pessimistic view of the situation, and he would be surprised if the British did not get their full share.

Mr. Balfour said that it could not be pretended that the British Empire alone, or in alliance with another empire, could prevent the legitimate development of other commercial and military empires.

**LAURIER'S FRIENDS
ARE SURPRISED**

Over Lt.-Gov. McInnes' Action.

DID NOT SEEK ADVICE IN OTTAWA BEFORE HAND

But Acted Solely on His Own Responsibility.

OTTAWA, August 11.—The supporters of the Laurier Government are simply astonished at Lieutenant Governor McInnes' action in dismissing the Turner Government, especially as he is an appointee of Laurier and to a certain extent implicates the Federal authorities by his action.

There is not wanting evidence, however, that the Dominion Government will not overboard unless he gets out of the present hole unscathed.

A high authority says Lt.-Governor McInnes did not seek any advice in Ottawa, as to the course he should pursue but on the contrary acted on his own responsibility.

It is said that if Mr. Beaven fails to form a Cabinet the only course open to the Governor will be to resign, as Beaven's failure would be tantamount to a provincial verdict of want of confidence in the Lieutenant Governor.

**SPAIN WITHDRAWS
HER CONDITIONS**

New Treaty to be Negotiated.

THE TERMS SAID TO BE SIMILAR, TO THE FIRST.

This Protocol, the Americans Expect Will be Accepted.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, August 11.—Spain has withdrawn from the conditions of her reply.

WASHINGTON [Aug. 11.—The Secretary, at one o'clock yesterday, made the following statement to the Associated Press: We have agreed upon a protocol embodying in the proposed terms for the negotiation of a treaty of peace including the evacuation of Cuba and Porto Rico, and it is expected this protocol will be accepted. It can be stated that the terms are precisely those laid down by the President in his original note about a week ago.

It is believed that nothing but a few formalities remain to be disposed of before the signature of the protocol.

Scotland Yet.

TORONTO, August 10.—The Evening Telegram's special cable says: Earl Minto, speaking at a dinner of the Agricultural Society at Hawick, Saturday, said he appreciated the honor which had been conferred upon him. He was alive to the interests of Canada, for which country there was a great future. He expressed regret at leaving Scotland, yet he was a characteristic Scotsman and would not shirk from any duty he was called to undertake, even though doing so involved giving up home interests. He had travelled the world over, and found Scotchmen leading the vanguard. He was going to join the vanguard, and hoped to do like other Scotchmen who had gone before him.

The Federal Council of Germany has sent Prince Bismark an address of condolence. It refers to the deceased as "The great heroic first Chancellor of the united Fatherland," and continues:—"The two decades during which he worked at our head have become imperishable landmarks of Germany's greatness and welfare and his spirit was so powerful that it will continue to make itself felt for centuries to come. His name will always be honored as the supreme essence of true patriotism and nation leading statecraft. To him is assured the everlasting gratitude of the Federal Council and of the whole German nation."

LONDON, Aug. 10.—The parliamentary secretary of the foreign office, Mr. N. Curzon, answering a question in the House of Commons yesterday, said Her Majesty's government had no information in regard to the reported cession of the port of Bahita, on Asab Bay, Red Sea, to Russia for use as a coaling station. Mr. Curzon added that he was not aware Abyssinia had any power to cede that port to Russia.

Significant Mission.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—Lord Charles Bessford is going to China to look after British contemplated investments. No fitter man than this enterprising and business-like admiral could be selected. His mission indicates the prevailing distrust as to the efficacy of Lord Salisbury's diplomacy to conserve British commercial interests in China. Lord Charles Bessford is to be absent several months.

Lost Explorers.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 10.—A letter received by the Alaska Commercial Company, dated Unalaska, July 28, says: "Information received here to the effect that an entire party of 12 prospectors, calling themselves the Columbia Exploring Company, together with the Rev. B. Weber, a Moravian missionary, his wife and two native pilots, bound for the Muskivite River, have been lost."
