BLAME PILOT THE HAGUE, The Netherlands, May 22 - (Reuters) - Two errors of judgment by the pilot caused the crash of the Dutch Constellation plane at Bombay last July 12, in which 13 leading American journalists died, the Dutch Aviation Council announced today. The Royal Dutch Airlines craft was piloted by 33-year-old Captain M. Van Der Vaart. It crashed on a hill near Bombay's Santa Cruz airport, killing all aboard - 11 crew and 33 passengers.

The Executive of the Drama Festival Association met recently to finalize plans for the forthcoming P. E. I. Drama Festival.

The Adjudication Committee reported having secured the Empire Theatre, Charlottetown, for the Drama Finals, at which time, Mr. J. L. Robertson, C. D. A., of Halifax, will be the adjudicator. Much satisfaction was expressed in having Mr. Robertson's services available, as many Islanders are familiar with Mr. Robertson's voice as "Angus Gillan" in the daily farm broadcast of the Gillan family.

It was reported that Miss Mary Moran had agreed to judge the Junior Drama play-off while Mrs. J. P. Miller would judge all Senior groups in Queen's County. The adjudicator for Prince County has yet to be chosen.

Much regret was voiced concerning the withdrawal of the only King's County entry. It was agreed that if the Murray River group desired, they could be given an adjudication in their own locality as a guide and assistance for future efforts.

Mrs. Roy Smallman reported her success in collecting for the Scholarship Fund in the Charlottetown area; while Miss Bowness and Mrs. Laird stated good progress in collections from Summerside and Kensington. It was decided to place the money in bank until needed for winner's expenses at Drama Short Courses. Names of contributors to Scholarship fund are to be published in programme booklet for Drama Finals, in the press.

Mr. Vesey agreed to take charge of programme printing, Mr. Bugden being requested to procure ushers for the three night's performances of Finals.

It was decided that entertainment for adjudicators of play-offs and finals take the form of a social gathering after the last performance on May 31. Mrs. Bert Patterson very kindly offered her home for that evening, and her generous invitation was accepted with thanks. Executive members agreed to be responsible for refreshments.

June 8 was chosen as the date of the Annual meeting. Time and place will be announced later.

Atlantic Pact Council Decisions Hailed At Ottawa

By DOUGLAS HOW OTTAWA, May 22 - (CP) - Decisions of the Atlantic Pact Council were hailed as a major step forward on both sides of the Commons but defence headquarters pondered the possibility that the specialization policy may eventually work changes in the setup of Canada's forces.

The official reaction by high Government sources was that the concept of one balanced international defence force won't mean any major changes for Canada. But senior officers at headquarters, still largely ignorant of what happened at London, speculated that Canada may not be able to avoid alterations in her policy of small, largely-balanced forces for all three services.

Press accounts of the decisions became the subject there of numerous informal discussions that centred on the possibility that in time Canada, on Pact advice, will increase emphasis on one force at the expense of the others. This sort of a trend has already developed to a degree out of continental defence plans, with the fighter arm of the R.C.A.F. emerging as the key arm of the standing forces.

Defence Minister Claxton tabled in the Commons the communique issued after the London meeting of the Pact Foreign Ministers with its announcement that all 12 will
