The flocking of the rural population to the cities, its results and how to counteract them are problems that yearly become more serious. In the United States there has been a steady growth in the urban population during the last hundred years. In 1790 the percentage of the total population which lived in cities was 3.5. In 1890 it had increased to 23.12. It has increased more than 7 per cent. in the last decade.

England's percentage of urban population is the highest in Europe—48 per cent. Thirty times as many live in the cities as in the country.

News and happenings of special interest in the various fields where mechanics and artisans hold sway night and day.

France taxes bicycles. Bicycles will cost \$17,488,855. Shanghai is to have a cotton mill. London women wear check caps. Indigo is the sap of the indigofera. America has 12,350,000 stamps daily. A Chicago girl dyes her hair \$15,000 butlerly.

New Orleans has ordered an \$8,000,000 sewerage system. A florist estimates that \$500,000,000 a year is realized from flowers. It is estimated that in England a woman in every six earns her own living.

One of the latest toy fashions has two small wheels to support it on the track. In Paris the other day a barber shaved a man in a cage with a lion to am a wager. Carpenters in Japan earn on an average about 34 cents a day, measured by American money. A French railroad company has ordered clocks to be placed on the outside of every locomotive.

As a new it is alleged that margarine is made of butter and other inferior butter made of cream. At Jonkoping, Sweden, there is a monster machine which makes 1,000,000 boxes of matches per day. Chicago and Milwaukee are to be connected by an elevated bicycle road. A toll of ten cents will be levied. The cellar in the Bank of France resembles a large warehouse. Silver coins are stored there in 500 large barrels. As a result of improvements on the Seine that river is now navigable for 1,000 miles of its course.
