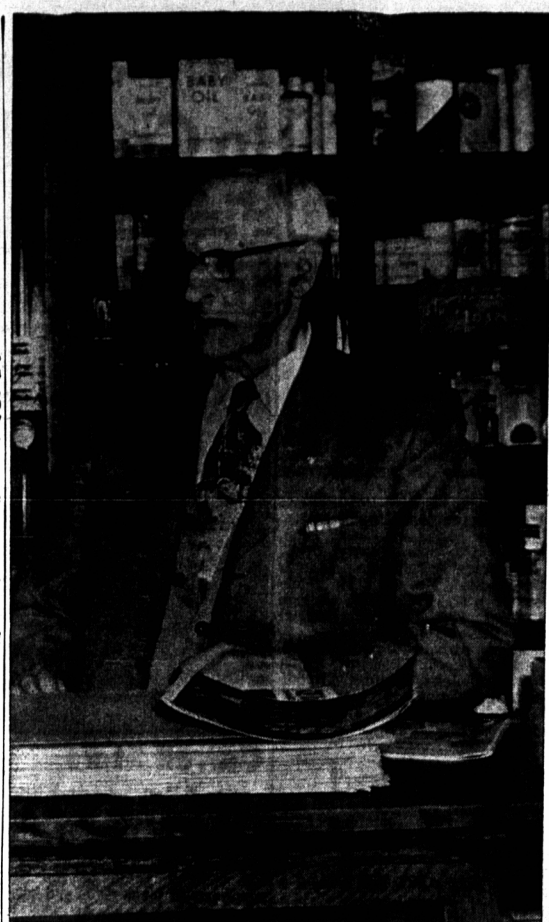

MR. H. J. MABON, VETERAN DRUGGIST
50-Year Plaque Awarded To Montague Druggist

Mr. H. J. Mabon, Montague druggist, was recently honored by the Prince Edward Island Pharmaceutical Association when he was presented with a 50-year plaque in honor of his services rendered to the public or over fifty years, prior to the celebration of Pharmacy Week October 2 to 8th.

Mr. Mabon, who has been in the drug dispensing business since 1897 having apprenticed with Mr. Lawrence W. Watson, druggist and chemist of Charlottetown in that year, is a charter member of the Provincial Pharmaceutical Association which was organized in 1905.

After having completed his training in Charlottetown, Mr. Mabon went to Boston where he worked for the next five years with Mr. W. A. Demeritt, druggist and chemist. He then returned to the Province where he opened a drug-store for H.A. Ellis and J. W. Carruthers at Murray River. At the end of the year he opened his own drugstore at Souris, and ten years later moved to Montague where for the past 36 years, he has operated a successful business.

In 1914 he also completed the necessary studies as an optometrist.

In 1905 he married the former Ella May Lord of Victoria. They have two children. Mr. Mabon was one of the leaders responsible for the formation of the Pharmaceutical Association on P. E. I. He served on the council for a number of years. Always interested in civil affairs he served on the Montague town council, and presided as mayor for four years. He is a mason and a shriner, and also a prominent odd-

Reviews Progress Made In Rural Beautification

Almost three hundred people last night attended the tenth annual dinner of the Rural Beautification Society of Prince Edward Island held at the Charlottetown Hotel. The main dining room could not contain the guests and the overflow was served in the West lounge.

Col. E.W. Johnstone, who conceived the idea of a competitive beautification program ten years ago, noted in his address that when the competition was thrown open to the Island in 1946 there was only one competitor. This has grown to a steady average of 150 entrants annually with 146 this year.

The President termed the scheme the germ of an idea started with very little money to the greatest movement that has ever been made toward mass beautification of the Province. Ten classes were competed in namely: Farm Home Improvement; Small Holding Improvement; Outstanding Home; Building Improvement; Veteran's Contest; Flower Gardens; School Improvement; Rural Cemetery Improvement; Community Improvement; Village Improvement.

Col. Johnstone expressed surprise at the manner in which the idea took fire among rural residents of the Province. He said there were times in the program when the executive felt that they had reached the saturation point and nothing more could be done. It was the rural people themselves, by the interest which they showed, that kept the program going. "Perhaps the most significant thing we have done so far is to establish the fact that the words 'Rural beautification' can mean something tangible to everybody," said Col. Johnstone.

His Honour Lieutenant Governor Prowse, who with Mrs. Prowse attended the meeting, congratulated the prize winners and all those who took part in the contest. His Honour noted that the Island has never looked better than it has this year and expressed the opinion that this was due in no small measure to the efforts of those concerned with the work of the Beautification Society.

Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Agriculture and representing the Premier of the Province, spoke briefly, congratulating the winners and the directors of the contest. After the presentation of prizes, Mr. Bramwell Chandler, Secretary of the Society showed pictures of some of the prize winning entries noting the difference before and after improvement. The Prize list appeared in this paper on October 14.
