*"MY SON JOHN" SUPERB FILM DRAMA: PACKS SOLID EXCITEMENT, SUSPENSE

In Leo McCarey's "My Son John," the Paramount picture which opens Monday at the Prince Edward Theatre, Helen Hayes gives a superb demonstration of why she is known as America's first actress. In the key stellar role of this timely and important drama about a woman whose favorite son commits an act of treason, Miss Hayes delivers an eloquent and hugely moving performance that will probably stand as an all-time screen classic. "There is much to recommend "My Son John." Its story is exciting and suspenseful. It is beautifully played throughout, and it has been incisively directed by McCarey. But it is Miss Hayes' stirring and delicately shaded performance that really steals the show.

With Dean Jagger, Robert Walker and Van Heflin co-starring, the film considers the plight of an average American small-town family when they are thrust into the national headlines by the ideological confusions and moral weakness of one son, Miss Hayes as the mother, Robert Walker as the guilty youth, Jagger as the father and Heflin as a government agent recreate the explosive consequences as the true meaning of the son's treachery is slowly uncovered.

With father and son brought to a violent showdown, the mother travels to Washington to prove or disprove his complicity in the crime that casts its grim shadow over a once happy family. Her shocking discovery confirms the evidence gathered by the FBI, and she is forced to choose between maternal devotion and patriotic duty.
