Local and Other Items.

MANY PILGRIMS.—During the past summer, over 50,000 pilgrims a month visited the shrine of La Bonne, Ste. Anne, Quebec.

FREAK APPLE TREES.—Mr Lachlan Cameron, of Iroquois, Ont., has two apple trees of the same variety which are curiosities. The fruit has no seed, a hollow conical cavity being where the core should appear. This freak has puzzled the local fruit growers and botanists.

A BAD ACCIDENT.—A young man named Stephen Hubley of Halifax, met with a painful accident a few days ago. He got under a car to shelter himself from the rain at the deep water terminus. A train backed down on him, three wheels going over both legs. The limbs were amputated.

VALUABLE COPPER DISCOVERY.—Robert Muir was in town yesterday. Mr Muir says that there is a vein of copper at Eureka a mile and a half wide all the way from Hopewell to Fish Pools. It is capable of turning out 300 tons a day. The assay went 13 per cent of pure copper, which is very rich. It shows also traces of gold and nickel.—New Glasgow Enterprise.

HE WANTS DAMAGES.—Arch McDonald, of Grand Narrows, C. B., intends bringing action against the Dominion Government because the body of a female relative who died of diphtheria, in Boston, was detained by Dominion officials while on its way and buried at Lawlors Island. The officials claim that there was danger of the dread disease spreading, hence their action. The case will be ventilated in the courts—Bras d'Or Gazette.

HE LIVED IN BED.—The Montreal Star says: One of the many peculiar actions entered in the Police Court was made out there when Mr William H. Smith, was charged with non-providing. It seems that the man has the unusual record of having spent the most of his time in bed for upwards of three years. His wife who made out the complaint against him alleges that he has not spoken to her for this period. She claims that she kept the family on her own earnings, and he only resumes an erect position when it is necessary to eat.

It is estimated that there are six thousand hunters in northern Ontario on the track of deer. The official who makes the estimate also says the deer are increasing in number. The average hunter would not appear to be a very serious game destroyer.

A report from Vancouver that C. P. R. steamers have been commissioned by the admiralty for immediate service as armed cruisers is denied by the Canadian Pacific authorities who say the story is absolutely unfounded.

Wordsworth on Women.

Wordsworth indulges not infrequently in caustic remarks on women who write, toward whom he always retained a rooted objection. It is said that after Miss Martineau took up her residence in his neighborhood this abhorrence to authoresses sometimes took such active expression that the deaf lady was frequently obliged to see what she could not hear and perforce to recognize that her presence was unwelcome at Rydal Mount. She herself, however, makes no mention of anything of the kind when alluding to the Wordsworths and her intercourse with them.

On one occasion, after unsparingly condemning a work by Miss Sedgwick, he concludes his criticisms thus: "Such productions add to my dislike of literary ladies—indeed make me almost detest the name." And further on again I find the rather sweeping announcement that "blue stockingism is sadly at enmity with true refinement of mind." This last is said in reference to Sara Coleridge, whom he rather pettishly accuses of monopolizing Mr. Quillinan's attention on one occasion during the time of the latter's engagement to his daughter Dora. Perhaps as the remark is made in a letter to Quillinan himself something in the nature of a tacit reproof may be included in it for him also.—Cornhill
