Evidence Heard In Assault Case

SUMMERSIDE — The trial of Norman Gallant, Summerside, charged with assaulting James Hustler causing bodily harm on the evening of Saturday, March 24, was continued in police court yesterday before Magistrate Richard S. Hinton, QC, and after the evidence of one crown witness was adjourned until Wednesday, May 2.

John Peter Arsenault, Summerside, told the court he left home at 5:25 on Saturday evening of March 24 to go to work at marine wharf.

He testified that as he got near the union warehouse at the rear of Home's store he saw a man come out from a ditch near the west end of the building running toward him. He stated he recognized the fleeing man as Norman Gallant, the accused, whom he had known for about eight years and "had worked with him."

The witness said he found the complainant James Hustler, lying on his left side near the warehouse, his face covered with blood. He said he didn't recognize him for a few seconds because of the blood.

Arsenault told the court he picked Hustler up and stood him against the building. "He was bleeding from the face and his hands were all over blood." He said there was a "cut in his pants in either the right or left side about six inches long and the right pocket was cut or tore off his pants."

"I picked up about two and one-half or three inches of a knife blade and a hat and shoes (Hustler) had been lying on." Arsenault said he helped the victim for a short distance and

Crop Insurance Agents Selected

Six agents have been chosen by the provincial Crop Insurance Agency to call on some 5,000 farmers who may wish to take out crop insurance on their potato crops.

The agents were chosen at a meeting of agency officials Tuesday

and their names will be made public following a further meeting Thursday, according to Agriculture Minister Andrew MacRae.

Mr. MacRae said yesterday that two agents will work in each county of the province, calling on growers with application forms and explaining the crop insurance plan.

When the agents begin their work, they will travel over the province for three days, calling on growers, then report back to the agency.

Mr. MacRae said he hopes growers "will take to the insurance plan which we feel will be of definite advantage to growers."

Premium rates for insurance to the grower is \$5.06 per acre. Maximum insurance coverage per acre is \$158.05.

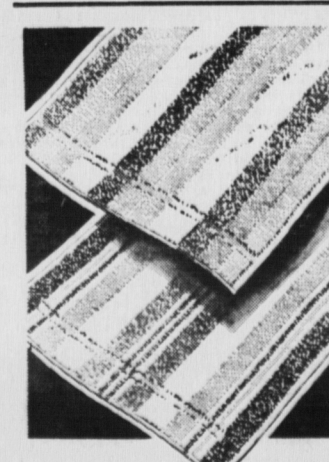
