Manitoba & Saskatchewan Want No Hansard Reports

By THE CANADIAN PRESS Two provincial legislatures Tuesday turned down suggestions that they keep written records of their debates.

Manitoba's Premier Campbell said a provincial hansard would lead to abuses and Alberta Premier Manning said it was not worth the expense.

A hansard, the leader of Manitoba's Liberal-Progressive government said, could get out of hand. Ottawa members often got copies of their speeches through hansard to flood their constituencies. It was an "expense the taxpayers shouldn't have to carry."

Alberta's Social Credit majority voted 38 to 18 against an opposition motion for a permanent record. Premier Manning said the session's proceedings could be covered in a brief synopsis.

DEFEAT GRAIN MOTION An opposition motion that the federal government be pressed to make cash payments to farmers for farm-stored grain was defeated in the Manitoba legislature. The motion also urged the federal government to assume carrying charges on all grain in storage in all positions at the end of the crop year.

The Saskatchewan house was told expenditures of the province's hospital services plan in 1955 totalled \$19,308,501, more than \$10,000,000 above the amount collected in taxes for the scheme. The plan covered 822,856 residents or 92.6 per cent of the population. Per-capita cost was \$23.46, compared with per-capita revenue of \$10.81. The plan is operated by the CCF government.

Liberal opposition leader Farquhar Oliver charged the Ontario Progressive Conservative government is trying to rule by commission instead of through the legislature. Speaking on a government bill to set up a water resources commission, he said too many commissions and boards are being used to conduct provincial affairs.

The government plans to spend \$2,400,000,000 on the water-shortage problem. \$1,100,000,000 for water-works projects and \$1,300,000,000 for sewage disposal. New Brunswick Premier Fleming said a provincial election "must come within 18 months" but named no date. His Progressive Conservative government was elected in 1952.

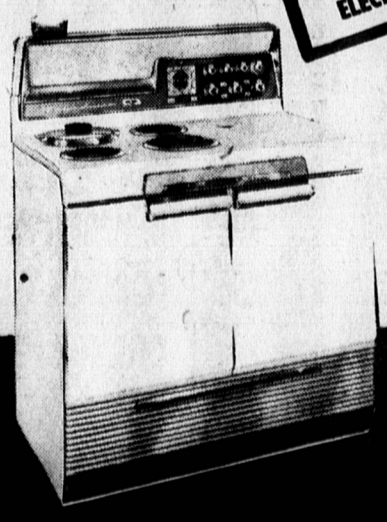

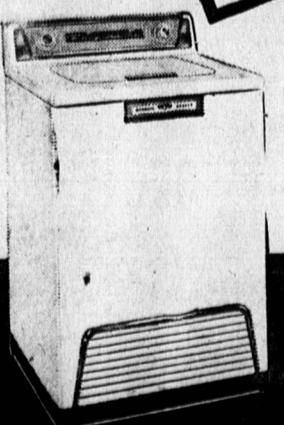

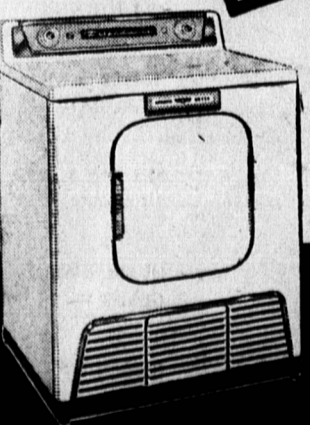
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IN MEMORIAM
