UNSOCIAL SNAKES. (New York Times.) The staging of a glass-front snake enclosure as a bit of tropical jungle to benefit an Indian cobra suffering with homesickness has proved such a success that Curator Raymond Ditmars, of the Bronx Zoo, intends to make over the interior of the reptile house in Bronx Park.

more cages made to represent jungle scenes to accommodate the tropical snakes and reptiles. Some will represent scenes in the desert, some will be made into bits of northland woodland scenes, and others will be converted into stone caverns, and there will also be a leafy nook beside a flowing stream.

"It is wonderful what good effect the painted back drops, sides scenes, and other stage property have had on the cobra," said Mr. Ditmars. "The cobra was put in the jungle cage one day last week, and he picked up so wonderfully that I have been led to reptiles can be put in the same kind of cage. It was when I tried to form happy families that trouble came."

The first experiment was to put some harmless Indian snakes in the enclosure with the cobras. It was all right until it came time to feed the harmless snakes. Then the cobras, which had become very active among the bamboo trees and the artificial leaves of their new surroundings, started in to get the food intended for the smaller snakes. The cobra is not particular what he eats, and so there was a scurrying to the tre-tops of the small snakes while the cobras finished their meal. There were no fatalities, though one small snake disgorged just in time to prevent being swallowed by one of the large fellows. The life of the cobra is fatal, and so the keepers were not enthusiastic over rescuing the small snakes' food.

Mr. Ditmars next experimented by taking out the cobras and putting some gopher snakes in with some tree lizards. Half an hour later the keepers arrived in time to stop an interesting lizard hunt. One snake was swallowing one of the small reptiles, but help came and the wriggling meal was rescued in time.

A very quiet family of pythons was next introduced into the jungle scene, and as companions they were given some tree snakes. In the ordinary course of things the pythons would have remained at the bottom of the enclosure while the tree snakes fastened themselves among the artificial leaves. The pythons, inspired by their vivid green surroundings, after losing for a while, came to the conclusion that they would rather live in the tree snakes to the bottom, and would their great weight about the property tre-tops and refused to share their upper storey with the tree snakes. As tree snakes are most at home in trees, Mr. Ditmars separated them.

Mr. Ditmars will continue his experiments until he has selected the groups that can live in unity and peace.

Director Smith, of the Central Park Zoo, is asking the board to estimate for \$250,000 to replace the antiquated animal houses in the park with sanitary buildings of stone and concrete. The elephant house there was built in 1883, and it is planned to replace it with one large enough to include the elephants and the tapirs.

Plans are made for at least five large animal houses, as well as buffalo houses, deer houses and sheds. The lion house was built forty years ago, and is now said to be inadequate. This will be replaced, and all the cages except those occupied by the hippopotamus and the tapirs, will be replaced with iron cages and wooden floors. A new monkey house where the specimens can be exhibited to better advantage; a home for small mammals, which is needed, and a great aviary, large enough for flights of birds, are contemplated.

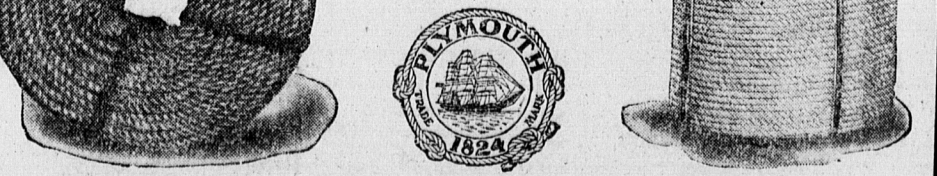
