### They Protest Vigorously.

HALIFAX, Oct. 5.—Joint committees of the Board of Trade and City Council met yesterday and passed a strong resolution condemning the action of the Minister of Trade and Commerce in advising for tenders for the winter mail and passenger service, leaving it optional whether the steamer calls at Halifax or not. The resolution demands that both mails and passengers shall be landed at Halifax. Sir Richard has had a copy of the resolution wired him.

The Cubans all declare that autonomy for Cuba is out of the question, but most of them are in favor of paying Spain a reasonable indemnity providing she evacuates the island at once.

TORONTO, Oct. 3.—A special cable from London alleges that Chas. R. Devlin, ex-M. P., Ottawa, has resigned the position of emigration agent to Ireland.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Oct. 3.—At eight o'clock tonight there had been twenty-seven cases of yellow fever reported and but two deaths. In the past week the foci of infection have not been largely increased. Dr. Metz reports that by Tuesday all the houses in the St. Claude district, where the infection was first introduced, will be released from quarantine.

the Jesuit fathers in Boston, an event of much importance to the Catholic people of Boston and vicinity, was celebrated with great pomp and magnificence in St. Mary's church, Edgartown street to-day. Not since the golden jubilee of Archbishop Williams, a few years ago, at the cathedral, have there been so many of the prelates of the church at any religious event in this city.

WINKIPPEG, Oct. 2.—A great prairie fire did an immense amount of damage yesterday. The fire extended from Morris to the west side of Portage la Prairie. At Pagot the C. P. R., station, two elevators and a number of other buildings were burned. At Beau St. Jour, forty miles east of Winnipeg, two women and five children named Moreski were burned to death, their escape being entirely cut off.

LONDON, Oct. 2.—The prevalence of typhoid fever at Maidstone, Kent, is increasing and there is absolutely no business doing. There now 1,175 cases of the disease, and there have been 46 deaths, six of which occurred last night. The surface impurities of the water supply; due to the drainage from a hop picking encampment, have not abated. In addition to the many doctors and nurses who have arrived from other places to care for the sick, a large number of volunteer nurses have been advertised for. Some of the residents have become panic stricken at the alarming state of affairs, and the continual tolling of the church bells denoting the burial of the dead, and many are leaving their homes.

### NEWS NOTES.

The Vossische Zeitung says the German Government is taking steps to introduce a bill to increase the beer tax three fold.

The Bank of Montreal is to establish a branch office at Buffalo, N. Y., similar to the one carried on in New York.

There are two cases of leprosy in Welsh county, North Dakota. The victims are Scandinavians, and the disease is said to be well developed.

The Ameer has rudely refused the request of the Afghans and Orkzains for more ammunition. This is the most convincing proof he has yet given of his fealty to British allegiance. The Ameer has evidently come to the conclusion that the British have the heavy end of the stick and that they are in earnest.

At Bellevue Hospital, New York, a woman under treatment for Jamaica ginger in ority. She says she has an uncontrollable desire for ginger, as it produces a stimulating effect, but does not intoxicate her, and she believes she could live on it.

A Georgian farmer whose henry was constantly raided by colored gents and ladies bought a gallows this spring on which a man had been hanged, built a hen house of the wood, and talked a lot about it. Never a chicken has been stolen since from the hen house.

A new U. S. torpedo boat broke itself down during a trial the other day. Just after this mishap a German torpedo boat went down from incapacity to stand the seas it met. Now a British craft of the same class has broken in two after going ashore. Torpedo boats and destroyers seem to be as frail as they are dangerous.

A man in Iowa invited a girl to go with him to the theatre. A bicycle was offered to be drawn by lot among the audience. The woman won it, and the Iowa man—generous soul—claimed the wheel, as he had paid for the woman's ticket. The result was a law-suit, and the jury awarded the case to the woman.

Wm. Ogilvie, Dominion Government Surveyor, who is now at Victoria, says there are provisions enough at Dawson for 4,000 people for the winter. When he left Dawson, on July 15th., there were 8,000 there, but if, as reported, many have left since then the situation will not be as feared. He says it is no use trying to take in food with dog trains.

Premier Ball has no doubt good ground for attributing the misfortunes of Greece in a large degree to the Emperor of Germany, but it is a question whether his frankness will do Greece any good at the present juncture. Emperor William, if he thought it worth while to retort, would probably do so in the classic phrase of Bos Tweed. "Well, what are you going to do about it, see?" Greece can do nothing; she is in the position of the little boy in the great European playground, and if Germany bullies her, she can only squeal.

Fredrick Hiltze of 364 Dabbis street, Detroit, Mich., went to the People's Saving Bank one day last week and drew \$90. The same day he paid in advance an undertaking bill of \$40 and ordered a gravestone, paying \$25 cash. He gave the receipts to his daughter, Mrs. William Dickman, with whom he was living. Next morning Hiltze hanged himself. He was 94 years old.

The Edmonton Bulletin asks why we calculate the weight of grain and vegetables by the bushel, when they are nowadays never or rarely sold by measure, but always by weight. The reason is probably that old custom is stronger than convenience. The immediate cause of the Edmonton protest is that, in British Columbia which is the market for much of the districts' produce, grain and other products are sold by the ton, and each transaction involves an awkward arithmetical calculation, as much out of place as would be the reckoning by pounds, shillings and pence these days of decimal currency. The Weights and Measures act provides that a cental or hundred pounds shall be a legal weight, and in a few places it has been adopted. It would simplify transactions if the rule became general.
