Georgetown Busy Port These Days

The Norwegian freighter, S. S. Sonny Boy, was expected to complete loading slightly more than 4,000 bags of seed potatoes at Georgetown last night and to sail for Havana, Cuba at daylight this morning. The ship arrived in port last Thursday morning and loading operations have been proceeding since. The cargo is being put aboard by the Associated Shippers.

Other ships in port at Georgetown include the S. S. Ulna, loading potatoes for Sydney, and the M. V. Eskimo which arrived Friday evening to take on a general cargo. Loading of the Eskimo has not started. Much of the cargo is being trans-shipped by rail from Charlottetown, it was learned. The Eskimo had been scheduled to call at Charlottetown but was diverted to the King's County port because of ice conditions. A motor vessel is due at Georgetown from Newfoundland to load produce.
