

U.S. Retains Hopkins Cup In Golf Play With Canada

LA JOLLA, Calif. (AP)—The United States retained possession of the Hopkins trophy Wednesday, defeating Canada in the international golf series between picked teams of professionals from the two countries.

With one match still to be finished, the Americans sewed up a majority of the 27 points involved in two doubles matches played Wednesday afternoon.

They scored 11 points to seven for Canada in the singles Wednesday morning.

The Canadian team of Al Baiding and Gordon Brydson, both of Toronto, upset the favored American team of Cary Middlecoff and Lloyd Mangrum, but it was not enough to overcome the United States lead.

LOSE THREE
The underdog Canadians, on even terms when play resumed Wednesday, came up with victories in two of the six singles matches, breaking even on one and losing the other three.

The scoring rules provide a total of three points for each match—two for the low scorer on each nine and one for the overall winner. In case of ties, each player receives a half-point.

Play was at the hilly La Jolla Country Club, measuring 6,583 yards with a par of 36-36-72.

Two of the Americans swept the points in their matches, Cary Middlecoff crushing Bill Kerr of Montreal while Chick Harbert downed Canadian Open champion Pat Fletcher of Saskatoon by 3-0 scores.

Ed Furgol scored the third American victory, downing Al Baiding of Toronto 2½-1½.

CANADIAN WINNERS
The Canadian winners were Henry Martell of Edmonton, victor over Marty Furgol, and veteran Jules Huot of Montreal, who defeated Jerry Barber. Both had 2½-½ margins.

Canadian PGA champion Stan Leonard of Vancouver and Jackie Burke of Klamath Lake, N.Y., split their points with 1½ apiece.

Middlecoff, winner of the Bing Crosby tournament last week and of the 1949 U. S. open, had the low medal score, a two-under-par 70, as he finished five holes up on Kerr, who had a 77.

Burke was the only other player to equal par, but Leonard's one-over-par 73 gained him an even break in match play as they finished all square, Leonard gaining a one-hole advantage on the front nine which Burke cancelled on the way home.

Paige Picked By Baseball Congress

WICHITA, Kan., (AP)—Leroy (Satchel) Paige, ageless Negro hurler who took part in its first national tournament, was tagged by the National Baseball Congress Wednesday as most outstanding athlete in the "Nationals".

It picked Paige from the 10,240 players who have competed in the 20 National tournaments to date.

As a highlight of observance of the 25th year of its program, the non-pro congress said Paige will be presented an honor plaque in Wichita next Sunday.

Paige hurled for Bismarck, N.D., which won the first National non-pro tourney in Wichita in 1935.

Paige signed with Kansas City Monarchs in 1932 and remained until signed by Cleveland Indians in 1949 for a turn at the majors.

Borden Airman Leading Player On Hockey Team

METZ, France.—During the normal week Corporal F. V. (Frank) Oatway, son of Mr. and Mrs. N. Oatway of Borden, P. E. I., goes into work, does his job and returns home in the evening—just another of the boys in blue.

Two or three evenings a week he changes from Air Force blue to the red and blue uniform of his station's hockey team, the RCAP Flyers, and becomes one of their leading players.

The team, made up of personnel from 3 Fighter Wing, Zweibrücken, Germany, has recently returned from a hockey tour in Switzerland where it competed for the Spengler Cup, a famous international hockey trophy.

Tiger Jones In Unanimous Decision Over Sugar Ray

CHICAGO (AP)—Ralph (Tiger) Jones, unranked battler from Yonkers, N. Y., banged a unanimous 10-round decision over former middleweight champion Sugar Ray Robinson at Chicago Stadium Wednesday night.

Robinson was a ringside 8-to-1 favorite to achieve the second straight victory of his comeback campaign, but he was an empty shell against the constantly pressing Jones.

Sugar Ray, bleeding from his nose and a cut over his right eye, was a futile dancing doll against the hard-punching Jones, who at 26 was eight years younger than the chagrined former middleweight and welterweight champion.

Referee Frank Sikora voted for Jones 99-94, while judge Ed Hintz called it for Jones 100-88 and judge Ed Walsh, 98-89.

Golf Tourney Begins Today

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—The annual \$15,000 San Diego golf tournament gets under way today at the Mission Valley Country Club, with 134 professionals and nine amateurs scheduled to tee off.

The big prize is \$2,500 and aiming at it will be last year's winner, Gene Littler, who played as an amateur and turned professional a week after whipping the pros.

An international flavor is added with the presence of three PGA champions—Chick Harbert of the United States, Canada's Stan Leonard of Vancouver and Red Best of Mexico.

OTTAWA (CP)—Fewer refrigerators but more home and farm freezers were manufactured during the first 11 months of 1954 than during the corresponding period of 1953.

The bureau of statistics reported Wednesday that 223,787 refrigerators manufactured during 1954 compared with 259,328 the previous year. Freezer output rose to 8,234 from 7,622.

The clubs now have played a total of seven hours and 22 minutes without a decision, and by taking the marathon tie to a fifth meeting they set a record for cup competition.

Three times previously a tie has been played five times before being settled, but each of these occasions was in the qualifying section of the tournament.

Bury built up a two-goal lead by half time Wednesday, but Stoke fought back to level the score and forced the game into overtime.

The fourth replay will be held next Monday at Manchester.
