Wall Paper Cleaning

There are several ways by which wall-paper can be cleaned so that it looks almost as good as new. If the paper is not very dirty, pin a clean cloth over the broom and sweep in even strokes, often replacing the dirty cloth with a clean one. But the following are good ways of cleaning rather soiled papers. Take a loaf of bread, stale but not too hard, and cut off one crust; then taking it in one hand, rub the paper gently with the exposed surface. When the bread looks soiled, cut off a very thin slice and proceed with the work. It is best to rub up and down on the paper, and clean each place thoroughly before leaving it. Another way is to take a loaf of bread, and after removing the crust, soak in ammonia. It must be so wet that one can work it in the hands into a ball. Rub the paper lightly with it, and, as the ball becomes soiled on the outside knead it until a clean surface is exposed. This will remove the dirt and smoke, and freshen up the paper wonderfully. Another plan is to make a soft dough of coarse flour mixed with water. It should be stiff enough to handle easily. The paper can be rubbed with it as in the former method. When there are grease-spots on the paper, lay coarse brown paper over them and pass a hot iron over it. Fresh paper may be needed several times if the spot is large; or the paper might be matched and neatly patched up.—Canadian Home Journal.

The Daughters of Clergy men.

The "Westminster Gazette" commenting on the death of Mrs. Lynn Linton, says that it calls attention to the circumstances that many of the famous women novelists come, as she did, of clerical stock. "Jane Austen was the daughter of a Hampshire rector, the Brontes were the daughters of the Vicar of Haworth, Olive Schreiner is the daughter of a south Africa missionary, and Mrs. Humphry Ward is the granddaughter of Rev. Thomas Arnold, the famous Headmaster of Rugby." To these says the "Examiner" of New York, may be added a notable American instance—Harriet Beecher Stowe, who was the daughter of Rev. Lyman Beecher, D. D.—Self Culture.

Ventilation

In the care of the home, if the doctor's services are to be dispensed with, ventilation must receive the respect due it. Healthful animal life cannot be sustained without plenty of pure air. During the cold weather especially, most homes are kept too much protected from the air; living in unventilated rooms has a tendency to lower the vitality and render the system peculiarly susceptible to cold and draughts. It is a fact that fresh air heats more quickly than air that is vitiated. Sleeping rooms should be aired in the morning, no matter how cold the day, and when these rooms are ventilated and the doors left open their freshness will steal through the entire house and be communicated to the lower rooms. A well ventilated house with an even temperature throughout the winter is always a safe place in which to live. Plenty of warm clothing and a temperature not too high is much more healthful than the use of thin clothing and the habit of living in badly ventilated rooms that show a high degree of heat.—Delineator.

The Tooth Brush.

It is erroneous to suppose that a large tooth brush is better than a small one for cleansing purposes. The small brush, slightly concave, and with its bristles of uneven length so as to penetrate all interstices, is far more efficacious and far less torturing. And either a brush should not be hard and unyielding, for in that case the proper pressure cannot be brought to bear upon the teeth without lacerating the gums and sometimes the lips. It should be stiff enough to remove all stains deposits, but soft enough to make the process painless. Both the outside and inside of the teeth should be brushed.—Exchange.

Spots From Plush.

To remove spots from plush, rub them lightly and rapidly with a clean soft cotton rag dipped in chloroform. Rub with a dry cloth. To raise the pile on plush, hold the wrong side of it over the steam arising from boiling water until the pile rises—or dampen lightly the wrong side and hold it over a rather hot iron—but not hot enough to scorch. Or heat a clean brick, place upon it a wet cloth and hold the plush over it; the steam will raise the pile.

KIPLING'S "RECESSIONAL."

Its Author Tells How He Came to Write It.

Rudyard Kipling has again been trapped by the wiles of the interviewer, this time somewhere in mid-Atlantic. Kipling's fellow-voyager had heard of the last attempt on the author's (private) life, when in reply to an innocent question concerning his poems the writer of "Barrack-room Ballads" curtly remarked he thought Kipling a much over-rated man, and turned on his heel and walked away. So the wise interviewer conversed with Kipling on every subject under the sun but his own works until in a weak moment the famous author began unconsciously to talk of himself and his poems. The interviewer then ventured a cautious appreciation of the "Recessional."

"Ah," said Kipling, "that poem gave me more trouble than anything I ever wrote. I had promised the Times a poem on the Jubilee, and when it became I had written nothing that satisfied me. The Times began to want that poem badly, and sent letter after letter asking for it. I made many more attempts, but no further progress. Finally the Times began sending telegrams. So I shut myself in my room, with the determination to try there until I had written a Jubilee poem. Sitting down with all my previous attempts before me, I searched through those dozens of sketches, till at last I found just one line I liked. That was, 'Let us forget.' Round these words the 'Recessional' was written."

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The following is a curious reason why the French do not care to travel. It is furnished by a member of the Colonial party: "When a Frenchman leaves his country for Tonkin, his nerves are irritated and his eyes offended the whole way out, by that hateful flag of England, which seems to give laws to the entire globe. You hardly meet with any other flag on the sea. You find it at Alexandria and Port Said, in this land of Egypt which lies under that hypocritical protectorate which the English Foreign Office is about to transform into a definite conquest. Then again, you come across it at Perim in the Red Sea, and at Aden, which commands the entrance of the Indian Ocean. Colombo comes in view; and, heavens! At Singapore you have come to regard the Union Jack as a matter of course; and you begin to speculate on how long it will take to fly from Singapore to Bangkok. One can hardly imagine, till he has experienced it, the relief felt by the arrival at Saigon, and by the sound of French bugles and the sight of our beloved tricolour."

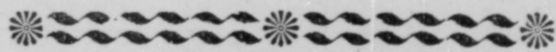

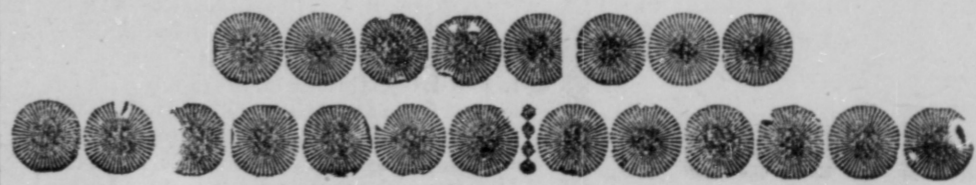
