## Stolen Goods Possession Case Is Adjourned

ALBERTON — Arnold Joseph Gaudet, Tignish, pleaded not guilty before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald at Alberton Wednesday to a charge under the Criminal Code of unlawful possession of a photograph valued at \$100, a quantity of silverware and a floor polisher valued at \$50, knowing they were obtained by the commission of an offense punishable by an indictment. Gaudet elected trial by magistrate and the case was adjourned to Feb. 3.

An Alberton South fisherman, Charles Patrick Powers, pleaded not guilty to possession of 420 live lobsters in a place where fishing was prohibited and using a dory in committing the offense. The case was also adjourned to Feb. 3.

Ronald Green, Charlottetown; Donald Gallant, Portage, and James Winfred Phillips, McNeill's Mills, were each fined \$10 and costs for driving without due care and attention. A resident of Elmsdale and one from Tignish received fines of \$20 and costs for illegal possession of liquor.

## Poor Car Brakes Bring \$20 Fine

Charged with driving a motor vehicle with deficient brakes, Russel A. Waite, Wiltshire, was fined \$20 and costs or six days when he appeared in traffic court yesterday.

Four persons were each fined \$10 and costs: Joseph Gerald Power, Charlottetown, having four persons in the cab of a truck; Nicholas Plagenhaef, Mt. Mellick, permitting an unlicensed person to drive a vehicle; Angus Matheson, Parkdale, driving without due care and attention; and Lorne W. MacNevin, Clyde River, turning a motor vehicle when it was unsafe to do so.

## Liquor Selling Case Adjourned

The case of Mary Mayme, Charlottetown, charged with unlawful sale of liquor, was adjourned to Jan. 26 in city police court yesterday.

Magistrate A.J. Haslam, QC, fined two persons \$20 and costs or 30 days for illegal possession of liquor and one person \$5 and costs or two days for failing to stop at a stop sign.

## Sentence Suspended For Theft

A two-year suspended sentence was imposed on Melvin Alan Jackman, Charlottetown, charged with break, entry and theft into MacKay's store, Stanley Bridge, by Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queen's County Magistrate's Court Wednesday.

MacKay's store was destroyed by fire last week.

Jackman, who had previously pleaded guilty to the charge, was ordered to post a \$1,000 bond and reside with his parents for the two-year period. Counsel for the accused was Gordon Tweedy.

John Wayne Casford, Charlottetown, was remanded to Queen's County Jail until Jan. 27 on a similar charge. He was represented by C.E. McQuaid.

(Continued from page 1) criminal lawyer and a counsel for Rivard, testified he repeatedly told Mrs. Rivard that he was unalterably opposed to bail for Rivard and that an application for bail didn't stand a chance.

Mr. Cohen said that after reading the evidence collected by an American grand jury against Rivard his belief was strengthened—a bail application was a waste of time.

Mr. Lamontagne, acting for the U.S. government in the Rivard extradition hearings here, has testified before the inquiry that Raymond Denis, former executive assistant to Immigration Minister Tremblay, offered him a \$20,000 bribe last July 14 to drop opposition to bail for Rivard, charged with conspiracy to smuggle narcotics.

**TOLD HIM HIS DUTY**

Mr. Cohen, once Mr. Lamontagne's law professor at McGill University, said: "I told him (Mr. Lamontagne) that he had a duty to perform and to perform it."

He described Mr. Lamontagne as "very honorable and a good lawyer."

Other witnesses Thursday included Senator Louis P. Gelin. Liberal party treasurer in Quebec for the last 13 or 14 years, and Linda Dumont, well-proportioned 23-year-old waitress and a friend of fraud suspect Eddy Lechasseur, a previous witness.

Senator Gelin, stern-faced and slightly flushed, said Masson is a "perfect stranger" to him.

Masson testified he telephoned Senator Gelin at Denis' suggestion June 23 to make an appointment so that he could tell him that \$60,000 was waiting for the Liberal party if Rivard were not extradited to face charges in London, Tex.

**NEVER GOT CALL**

Senator Gelin said he received a phone call sometime in June or July from somebody he didn't know and that he had cut short the conversation when the person said he was calling about the deportation of a citizen.

He said he knows of no contributions to the Liberal party from any company associated with Rivard, Lechasseur, Masson or Robert Gignac, a previous witness charged with capital murder in the Sept. 17 gangland slaying of nightclub doorman Rocky Brunette.

Miss Dumont, wearing a powder-blue angora suit and black cloche hat, said she discussed with Lechasseur Wednesday the testimony she would give at the inquiry.

"He (Lechasseur) told me just to tell the truth," she said repeatedly as lawyers questioned her closely about Lechasseur's coaching.

There was such animation in the courtroom when the shapely, statuesque waitress appeared Chief Justice Dorian had to call for silence.

**REPLIES APPLAUDED**

Some girls among the spectators applauded some of Miss Dumont's replies to lawyers. She described Lechasseur as "my good friend" and said Lechasseur had stayed at her home after 2 a.m. the night of July 20 following a get-together at Maxime's Lounge with Mrs. Rivard and Gignac.

Mr. Maranda also counsel for Miss Dumont, objected when commission counsel Desjardins asked whether Lechasseur had stayed all night at Miss Dumont's place.

Lechasseur himself has testified he did stay all night.

A little later, Mr. Maranda said the publicity of the Dorian inquiry might cause Miss Dumont harm. She worked in a public place and the curious might go to see her.

Miss Dumont said she knew sometime in the summer that Mrs. Rivard was pregnant.

Mrs. Rivard testified she was 5½ months pregnant in November when her husband's application for bail was refused and that she had a miscarriage alone in her home. She had not summoned medical aid.

**QUESTION ASKED**  
Mr. Cohen, asked whether he was represented by counsel, said with a wide grin, "I can't afford it."

Mr. Cohen said he remembered hearing a vague rumor that bribery money was being offered in the Rivard case.

He had dismissed it from his mind because courthouse rumors were "a dime a dozen."

Mr. Cohen said granting of bail by the courts is rare in extradition cases and especially when "large quantities" of narcotics are involved.

"I was convinced that an application for bail (for Rivard) was a waste of time," he added.

Mr. Cohen said he advised Mrs. Rivard "many times" a motion for bail could not prevail to her husband's case.

Rivard, 49, was moved to police cells near the old courthouse on Notre Dame Street where the Dorian commission is sitting. He says testify today.

## Fifth Prince PC Candidate Announces Campaign Plan

SUMMERSIDE — Claude Ives, Progressive Conservative candidate for the fifth district of Prince, announced yesterday he had completed plans for his campaign. He will visit every poll in the district, commencing yesterday with the west polls.

Mr. Ives has conferred with each member of the provincial cabinet concerning a number of projects. He stated he will be working to obtain early approval on the all weather highway from Miscouche to Albany and that he has high hopes of making an announcement confirming this project in the very near future.

Another project the PC candidate has discussed with the minister of highways is the widening and improvement of the Locke Shore Road, which has been requested to provide easy access to the beach in this area. He has also urged that flasher lights be installed at all dangerous highway intersections. This proposal met with favorable consideration, he said.

Mr. Ives stated he will work with the various communities to provide community playground areas, and will have a proposal to make to the village commissioners of Miscouche, St. Eleonore and Wilmet; also other areas, if required.

**SET UP OFFICE**

A request has been made by Mr. Ives that the provincial government set up a permanent office in Summerside for the future development of the industrial park. He has also recommended that this office could be used for the permanent secretarial services of the Summerside Board of Trade area if requested by the board.

Additional projects the Progressive Conservative candidate intends to pursue will be announced in the near future.

## STRIKE END EXPECTED

**N.Y. Longshoremen Vote For Contract**

NEW YORK (AP) — Longshoremen in the port of New York voted more than two to one Thursday to accept a once-rejected waterfront labor contract and end an 11-day multi-million-dollar strike at U.S. Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico ports.

The pact includes a controversial automation clause.

The AFL-CIO International Longshoremen's Association set up 13 polling centres for the rank-and-file membership along the 520 miles of waterfront in New York and New Jersey, and voting was held from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The final tabulation was 12,171 in favor of the contract, and 5,649 against.

The ILA plys no strike benefits and some 60,000 idle longshoremen from Maine to Texas had been living on savings or existing food to mouth since the walkout began Jan. 11.

The New York contract — which includes the first minimum annual waterfront wage ever negotiated—normally sets a pattern for other East and Gulf coast ports. Its approval was deemed certain to speed an eventual end to the strike. However, local issues in other ports were expected to delay any return to work at least until some time next week.

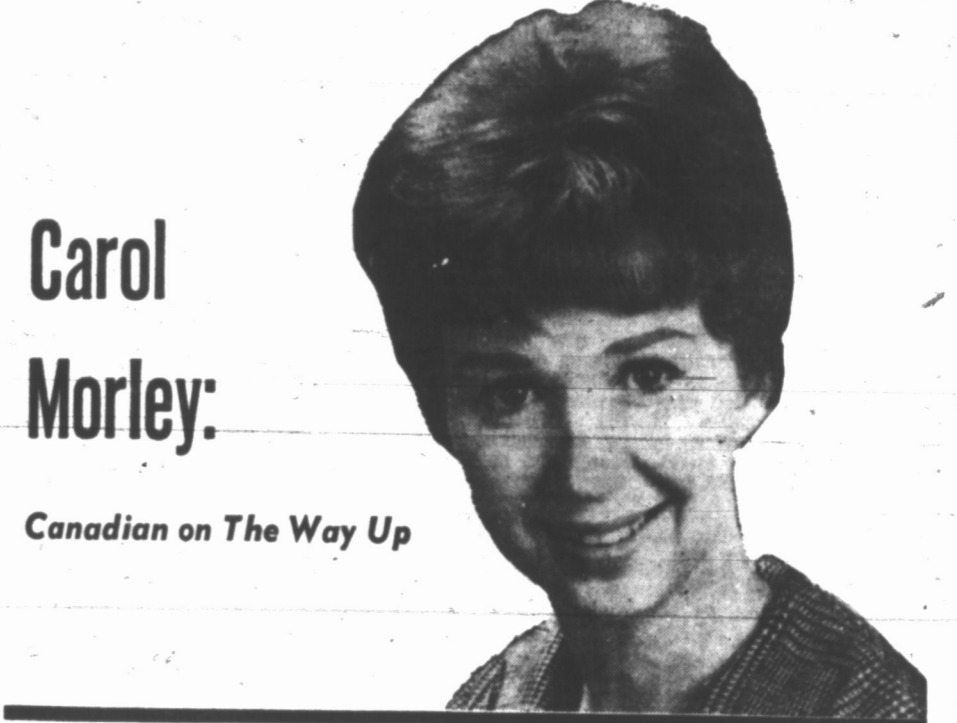
