Cardigan Ratepayers Discuss Rink, Dump

CARDIGAN — A special meeting of the ratepayers of Cardigan Village was held in the school Thursday evening to discuss the new site for a village dump and the Cardigan Canal project — the rink.

The closing of the old dump site, which had been in use since the incorporation of the village, made necessary the acquiring of a new location. Several sites were mentioned and it was decided the one most suitable was located on the property of Mrs. Irene Smith on the North side of the causeway and would be surveyed before contacting the owner with a view to buying the property.

The rink committee reported that the grading and leveling work on the rink site has been completed and it was decided to work on the rink. The rink is situated in the field formerly owned by Mrs. Gertrude MacInnis between the new post office and the CNR. As soon as weather permits work will be resumed on this project. Several methods of water supply were discussed. Sinking of a well or using water from the lake above the causeway were considered.

A sum of money was voted to assist the fish and game association in its winter works projects within the village limits. Complaints were heard from citizens regarding the snowplow plowing snow on the sidewalk located on the property of Mrs. Irene Smith on the North side of the causeway, thus necessitating pedestrians to walk on the road. It was left to the village commissioners to contact the correct authorities to remedy this situation.

The destruction of several old buildings which are unsightly and a possible fire hazard was discussed, and it was decided to write the provincial fire marshal for advice before contacting the owners.

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Two Remanded On Break, Enter, Theft Counts

SUMMERSIDE — Two youths, Joseph Leslie Chalson, 17, and Robert Melvin DesRoches, 20, Tuesday, were remanded for sentencing to Nov. 26 when they appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Magistrate's Court Thursday where each pleaded guilty to two charges of break, entry and theft.

Defendants pleaded guilty to a third charge of attempted arson.

The charges were from two breaks in Tignish, the first into the liquor store in the village where a quantity of liquor was taken and the second, into the home of the late John MacIntosh where several household appliances were stolen.

The breaks occurred during the night of Nov. 18. At the time of the break into the MacIntosh home the residence was unoccupied, the owner, John MacIntosh, having died that day.

Making the arrest were two members of the Alberton RCMP Detachment who investigated the breaks.

Fire Damages Kelvin Grove Farm Home

"I'll talk of Mr. Pearson," he said, then compared the present Prime Minister with Mackenzie King and St. Laurent, both of whom he had served over a period of years.

"I don't think Mr. Pearson was indecisive and his leadership, but they said the same thing about King who is 'a great man now and he is in his grave,'" Pickersill recalled that King never tackled a problem until everyone knew there was a problem, then he moved with public opinion to correct it, and everyone said he was a statesman.

Mr. Pearson is not afraid of new problems head on, and he has got enough at times to do that, he observed.

The Minister was introduced by Mr. Kichman and thanked by Alex. Matheson, provincial Liberal leader.

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Mr. Matheson reviewed briefly some of the things the present government has accomplished which assisted P.E.I., noted the difficulties of the primary producers and said "we are constantly striving to improve the lot of the farmer, the fisherman and the man who cut pulpwood."

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Lions And Stampeders Set Their Strategy

VICTORIA (CP)—Calgary Stampeders will throw the football.

British Columbia Lions will try to control it.

Neither club's disclosure concerned about this disclosure of strategy for Sunday's deciding game of the Western Football Conference playoff final.

"Put it this way," Calgary coach Bobby Dobbs said Friday, "I've got a 225 - pound average on my offensive line. They've got a 225-pound average on their defensive line."

"We didn't even try to run the ball Wednesday. We had no plans to run. We won't concede that on Sunday."

For Dave Skrien of the Lions, the main element of the game plan will be short-pass plays, hopefully for long line cutting running marches downfield.

BETTER BLOCKING

To re-establish the ball-control game, absent Wednesday when Calgary squared the best-of-three series with a 14-10 victory, Skrien wants better blocking and improved field position.

Lions were close to their own goal line so much Wednesday that they almost never had a satisfactory selection of plays available to quarterback Joe Kapp.

Skrien said that if his defensive backfielders are playing well, Skrien should not be able to win twice in a row by being only on the pass.

The Stampeders played only 27 yards on the ground Wednesday. They completed 14 of 33 passes for 218 yards.
