

Summerside Wins Junior Baseball Title

Leading By Score 8-6 When Game Is Called As Result Of Fracas

Johnny Carroll's Curran and Briggs Juniors from Summerside won the Prince Edward Island Junior Baseball Championship here Sunday afternoon by defeating the Charlottetown Abbies 8-6 in a game called by umpire Jimmy Hogan at the end of six and a half innings as the result of interference by two Abbeville players and approximately 500 unruly fans.

The Curranites, after losing the first game, roared back to take the next four straight and wrap up the bitterly fought series in five games. In winning they regained the championship which they lost to Charlottetown last year.

The Summerside Juniors came up with six runs in the sixth inning to go into an 8-6 lead. In the next inning Abbeville's Cliff Ready and Forbes Kennedy scuttled their team-mates' chances of staging a comeback with an unprovoked attack upon umpire Jimmy Hogan.

attacked the first base judge while most of the others milled around to watch proceedings.

When matters abated somewhat, Hogan gave ennyed the gate along with Ready and this provoked Kennedy to assault the umpire once more. Two or three outbreaks occurred amongst the fans on the field and the game was delayed so long it was impossible to commence an inning on account of the six o'clock curfew.

Before Ready and Kennedy sold out their team-mates' chances of prolonging the series, the Abbies had built up a 6-2 lead and blew it in the sixth inning. They still had a chance of getting back into the game for they were ready to come to bat in the last half of the seventh.

Donnie Simmons, although wild in the early innings, was tough to hit, and he went the distance to win his second game of the series for Curran and Briggs. Simmons allowed only four hits and proved tough after the second inning.

He was given shaky support at times as his mates committed eight errors. Simmons walked seven men and struck out five. The four hits he surrendered were singles.

Donnie MacLean, on the mound for the Abbies, was equally as wild as Simmons. MacLean gave up eight walks and although hit harder than his opponent, would have gotten through without trouble had he been given proper support. All eight runs by the Summerside Juniors were unearned.

The Abbies opened the scoring in the first inning with a single run. They were leading 4-2 at the end of the second and maintained this lead until the fifth when they added two more.

The roof fell in during the sixth Billy Purcell paced the Curranites' attack with a single and a double in two trips. Johnny Whelan and Benny Grady chipped in with singles.

Purcell led all batters with two hits. Doubles by Purcell and Simmons were the longest blows of the game.

Coke Grady, Summerside short stop, played with a badly injured foot but despite the handicap turned in a fine performance.

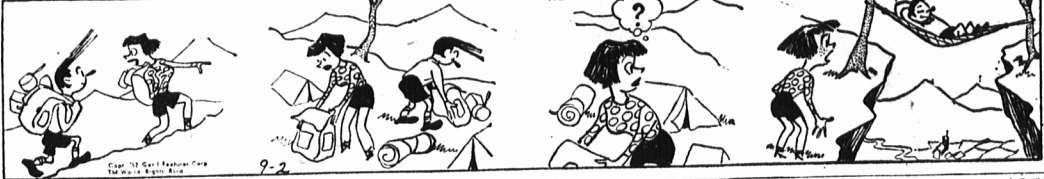

Maritime Central Airways won the right to meet the R.C.A.F. Royals for the Island Intermediate baseball championship Sunday afternoon when they defeated the Charlottetown Abbies 5-2 in the fourth series game. M.C.A. won the series three games to one.

M.C.A., coached by Jimmy MacDonald in the absence of Tom MacFarlane, played without the services of two of their regulars and with crippled Elmer MacNeill in right field but their ace left hander Monroo proved good enough to hold the Abbies to two runs.

Actually the M.C.A. batters won the game for Monroo in the first inning when they teed off on Charlie Ryan for five hits and four runs. The big blow of the inning was Glen Matheson's triple with two men on. Lorne Hennessy and Art Hughes contributed singles to M.C.A.'s cause.

From then on it was a nip and tuck ball game with the Abbies scoring two runs toward the end of the game. Both pitchers hurled a good ball for the last eight innings of the game which was well played and which lasted only one hour and forty minutes.

For Monroo it was his third victory over the Abbies in the best of five series. The big lefthander went the distance in the first game, came on in the second inning to win the second game and went the distance Sunday.

He gave up seven hits, all of them singles. He struck out seven men and did not issue a walk.

Charlie Ryan gave up only five hits in the last eight innings. Ryan, who has pitched all four games for the Abbies walked one and struck out one. The walk was the first he has issued in the last two games.

Lorne Hennessy, Arnold MacCallum and Art Hughes each picked up two hits for M.C.A. Jackie Cairns and Elmer Larter got two for the Abbies.

Art Hughes, Glen Matheson, Irving MacKinnon, Wally Shephard and Reg Hughes contributed the best fielding plays. Matheson made a lovely one hand pick down at third for M.C.A. in the seventh.

Shephard made a nice running catch off MacKinnon in the seventh and Art Hughes threw a strike to the plate from left field in the second inning to catch Jackie Cairns.

Halifax Wanderers Win Maritime Title Meet At Memorial Field

The Halifax Wanderers Track and Field team under the guidance of coach Jack Thomas won the Maritime Championship Meet at Memorial Field yesterday afternoon with a total of 61 points.

The Wanderers dethroned the Antigonish Highland Society team as Maritime Champs. The Antigonish team won top honors last year but yesterday despite the brilliant showing of their number one man Dr. John "Tink" Kyte they were forced to settle for second place.

The Antigonish boys scored a total of 48 points. The Halifax Navy and the Charlottetown Abbies tied for third place with 15 points.

The Navy team worked under a severe handicap. Their shot put act, Petty Officer Ronald Darby was killed Sunday night on his way to the meet when a car in which he was driving over-turned about 15 miles from Charlottetown.

The seven-man Wanderers team amassed most of their points in the track events. They took first place in every dash or run but the half mile as they captured the red ribbon in the 100, 200, mile, 400, mile relay and the six mile run.

In addition to taking first in these events they took most of the seconds and in some cases the thirds.

"Tink" Kyte, a dentist taking a post-graduate course in Montreal won the individual honors. Kyte placed first in the four events in which he competed to pick up 20 points. Jim Warner of the Wanderers was second with 15 points.

Wendall Barrett, George Walters and Ernie Matheson stood out in
