France's Maintaining Nuclear Force Plans

PARIS (Reuters) — France Wednesday night stuck to its policy of building an independent nuclear striking force after three-hour talks between U.S. State Secretary Rusk and Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville.

French sources said American thinking apparently was that the proliferation of nuclear weapons could be prevented by agreement but Couve de Murville said this was "illusory." The French sources said the foreign minister argued that in the absence of real nuclear disarmament it was impossible to prevent an industrial power from developing atomic weapons if it so desired.

Couve de Murville claimed it was unthinkable that France, any more than Britain, should renounce its national nuclear force, they added.

STILL BOYCOTT TALKS
The sources said Rusk again expressed hope that France would take its place at the resumed disarmament conference in Geneva next month but that there appeared to be no change in the French boycott of the talks.

But the French summing up of the talks here was that they were "very useful." The French were also said to have raised no objection to continued U.S. testing of Soviet intentions on Berlin.

According to U.S. sources, Rusk reiterated that U.S. policy opposed the spread of nuclear weapons but that the United States recognized the fact France was building an atomic force.

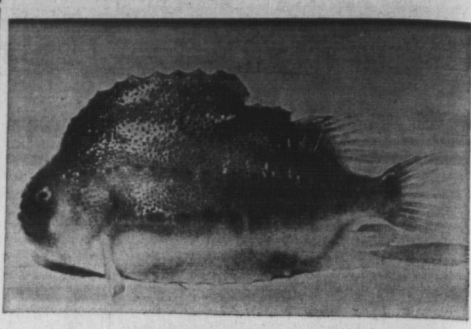
Afterward, Rusk paid an official call on Premier Georges Pompidou which was described as "very cordial." Sources said they both regretted the "often exaggerated presentation" of Franco-American differences in approaching certain problems.

SPEAKS OF NEED
Pompidou recently spoke of a need for a "rearrangement" within NATO to take into account Europe's growth as a military power vis-a-vis American military growth.

NATO Secretary-General Dirk Stikker, with whom Rusk lunched Wednesday, raised the "rearrangement" question in the June issue of the NATO Bulletin.

Stikker wrote that because of NATO's being solely dependent on the United States and the United Kingdom's capacity for nuclear reprisal, there has been a certain imbalance within the alliance.

Stikker added that President Kennedy had "taken a great step forward" by raising the possibility of a multilateral nuclear force and hereafter

Rollie Miles Won't Join Stampeders

EDMONTON (CP) — Rollie Miles, 33-year-old veteran back field star with Edmonton Eskimos of the Western Football Conference, said Wednesday in an interview he will not join Calgary Stampeders.

The decision means Miles likely will retire from professional football as he is the property of the Stampeders and can play for no one but them.

Stampeders drafted him for \$100,000 under the NFL player qualification plan. Provisions of the plan were revised at a meeting in Calgary last month after Eskimos disputed Calgary's original claim of Miles.

Miles, now a linebacker but formerly a halfback, was named a Western Conference all-star eight times in his 11 years of service with Edmonton.

Mantle Returns To Lineup

BALTIMORE (AP) — Mickey Mantle, sidelined more than a month with leg injuries, will return to New York Yankees' starting lineup Friday night against Tigers at Detroit, manager Ralph Houk announced Wednesday night.

Houk said Mantle will play in right field, rather than his usual center field spot "because in Detroit, it's the smallest area an outfielder has to cover."

"If Mick can make it in Detroit, he'll be able to play right field in Yankee Stadium when we get home after that series," Houk said. "If he can't, well then it's anybody's guess what happens."

Mantle said "my left knee still is waxy-waxy, but I want to try it."

Mantle was injured May 18 in the ninth inning of a game against Minnesota at Yankee Stadium. He tore an abductor muscle high in his right thigh while running to first base and landed heavily on his left knee. The thigh muscle has healed but in landing on his left knee, Mantle injured ligaments back of the knee and these are his main concern now.
