Work On New Theatre At Murray River Progressing

Fine progress is being made on the construction of Murray River's new theatre, the Mayfair. The building is now entirely enclosed, and the modern glass front has also been completed. The interior finish will be of the most recent design and entirely different from that of any small town theatre in the Province. Another week or so will see the work of the theatre in an advanced stage, but Mr. Emerson Johnson, the owner, has not yet set a definite date for the official opening. The new movie house will not only be a new source of entertainment for hundreds of people for miles around, but will also be an attractive addition to the interior equipment.

Annual Meeting Of King's County Plowing Match

The continued expansion and importance of the King's County Plowing Match was emphasized by Mr. Leslie Hunter, president, when he presented his annual report to the meeting held last night at Bridgetown. He told the gathering that to further enhance the fair a meeting of all livestock exhibitors in the county would be called for next week in an effort to build up the event to a Class B Fair stage. During the evening Mr. Albert Acorn, secretary-treasurer presented his report and it was learned that the financial condition of the exhibition was in a very satisfactory condition. The directors elected last night included Messrs. Louis Campbell and Louis Fitzpatrick, St. Georges; Clement MacDonald and Albert Acorn, Primrose; John MacLeod and William Hunter, Strathcona; Neil Nicholson, Mt. Hope; Douglas Matheson, Albion Cross; Wilbur Wood, L. S. Hunter, J. W. Clay, Robin Clay and Wally MacKenzie, Bridgetown; Jack Judson, Upton; John A. MacDonald, M.L.A., Cardigan; Alex Hamilton, New Perth; Jack Annear, Lower Montague; and W. B. Creed, Highfield. An opening was left on the directorate for a representative of the Queens County Plowing Match. The directors will meet at a later date to name a slate of officers.

Farm Loan Board Report Shows Island Borrowing

Farmers of this Province last year obtained 72 loans from the Canadian Farm Loan Board to bring to 839 the number now charged against the Island. To date the Board has disbursed 1,308 first mortgages and 313 second mortgages in this Province for a total value of \$2,267,317.99 and \$163,850. The value of the first mortgages issued during the last fiscal year ending March 31, 1953, was \$203,800, while the nine second mortgages had a value of \$4,900. Up to that period there were 830 first mortgages outstanding with a total principal of \$1,226,785 due. There were also 76 second mortgages due for a total of \$23,484. At the same time the Board had made three loans to Island fishermen with a total due of \$1,430. In almost all departments of the Board's accounting Prince Edward Island was seventh among the nine provinces. Newfoundland was not included for that fiscal year. The report of the Canadian Farm Loan Board was submitted to Hon. D. C. Abbott, Minister of Finance, recently, and briefly outlined the functions and duties of the Board. It stated that prior to the changes in the governing act the aggregate maximum loans were limited to 66 per cent of appraised value and not more than \$5,000. By virtue of the Amendment to the Act last year the Board may now lend up to 60 per cent of the appraised value and up to \$10,000 on first mortgages and may make an additional loan on second mortgage with a collateral chattel mortgage to bring the aggregate maximum loans up to 70 per cent of appraised value and up to \$12,000. In order to finance the loans the Board borrows money at current interest rates from the Minister of Finance. Heaviest borrowers under the plan are farmers of Saskatchewan who currently owe a total of \$7,139,832 although farmers of Quebec have been more frequent borrowers. The latter group have received 3,888 loans for \$5,779,827. The above totals are for first mortgages.

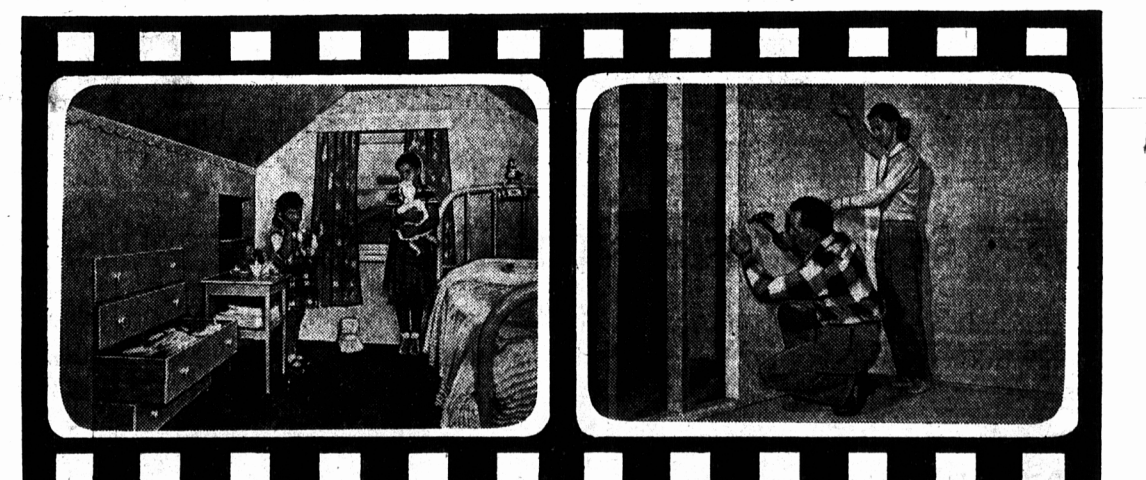
