Hull Is Red Hot

Bobby Hull of the Chicago Black Hawks in the National Hockey League appears to be headed for a bang-up season with the Billy Bunter coached team. Playing his eighth season in hockey's greatest league despite the fact that he is only 25-years-old.

The Chicago aggregation had his best season during the 1952-53 campaign when he was blinding red lights around the NHL circuit like he was going out with a 20 goal score on 70 goals over the 70 game schedule. This feat has only been performed by two other players in the National Hockey League: Maurice "Rocket" Richard, the Montreal winner of the Montreal Canadiens, fired 50 markers over a 50 game schedule 20 years ago and Bernie "Boom" Geoffrion, also of the Montreal Canadiens, hit the magic mark in the 1950-51 campaign.

Hull is 4th in the best of his career this term as he had forwarded 17 goals in 18 games at the time this column went to press. National Hockey League players do not usually reach their peak until between the ages of 25 and 30, so Hull may still have his best performances ahead of him. This could well be the year that the scoring ace of the New coached aggregation will break the magic number of 50 goals in a season set by "Rocket" Richard.

The Rocket's total career number of goals is 554, second only to Detroit's Gordie Howe who has dented the NHL tapes on 570 occasions. With Hull's youth and speed it is quite possible the super star of the Chicago packeters will wind up his career with over 600 markers.

Hull has 242 goals in his eighth season in the National Hockey League.

Bobby's scoring feats don't seem to be helping the slumping Black Hawks who are in 10th in the league standings. We don't think the team's performance has a great deal to do with Hull's scoring. It is more a hindrance to the club's progress. Reay usually played Mikita as much of late and has been an embarrassment of awe injury to the fiery Black Hawk pivot.

NEW YORK (AP) — Rookie Lou Angotti's goal with just more than three minutes to play gave New York Rangers a 3-3 tie with Chicago Black Hawks Wednesday night.

Angotti grabbed a pass from Feas Rattelle and beat Chicago goalie Glenn Hall from about 10 feet.

The Hawks had grabbed the lead four minutes earlier when Ken Wharram baited a short puck past Ranger goalie Jacques Plante.

But David Molson, president of the NHL Montreal Canadiens, said the fact six established pros will be facing off against the Russians is a "major breakthrough" in that it will lead to an international playoff for the Stanley Cup in the foreseeable future.

"It is my hope one day in the foreseeable future to see such a playoff," Molson said Tuesday at a press conference. "We Canadians are very enthusiastic about the development."

The Russians begin an eight-game tour of Canada Dec. 11 when they face the Junior Canadiens at the Forum.

Molson said the Juniors will be bolstered by six players from the Quebec Aces of the American Hockey League for the Russian game. It will mark the first time the Russians will be played against players of this caliber.

The league gets underway at Birchwood High this Monday night at 7:00 p.m. with a double header will take place.

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
