Local High School Squad Cops P.E.I. Football Ch'ship

Saint Dunstan's High School continued to dominate the Island Intercollegiate 'A' Football League when they routed Souris Regional High School, 35-0, yesterday afternoon in the third annual Potato Bowl, which was contested at the Saints home gridiron.

A crowd estimated to be about three hundred watched the Saints win its third consecutive Bowl; as many years as it has been in existence.

With 25 points under their belts the Saints went on to finish the game without allowing the Souris team to register a single point.

WEATHERBIE STARS. Bill Weatherbie quarterback, a member of the defensive backfield, and safety-back, led the Saints offense to four touchdowns of which one was a 25 yard pass to Bill MacKinnon.

The Saints took a 12-0 lead in the first half. Don Comers finished a well executed offensive series by running for the first Saints' touchdown from deep in the Souris zone.

Although the Souris offense completed three of four passes they were unable to produce any effective offensive gains.

Don Comers and Bill MacKinnon, two members of the Saints who stood out on offence, scored a touchdown each and carried the ball well behind the blocking of the hardy offensive line.

Howie Snow was a top performer on defence and set up the Saints final touchdown on an interception. The entire defence deserves to be called stars as they stalled the Souris offence time and time again and kept them from the scoreboard.

Even though Souris was not able to accomplish anything which was noticeable on the field, the "never say die attitude" of Mike MacCormack and Eugene MacDonald was evident. MacCormack recovered a Saint fumble and was in on many of the tackles. MacDonald, although his running was checked, was the leading ground gainer for Souris.
