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Steel Output Continues To Fall Short Of Demand

MONTREAL (CP) - Steel production still has not caught up with demand despite expansion by various mills and addition of new equipment, said A. C. Leslie and Co. in its December newsletter.

"Production figures for Canadian steel mills in 1956 will undoubtedly pass all previous records," the steel company said. With new steel-making capacity now being added, 1957 "should be bigger still."

The last year has been difficult from the supply point of view because warehouses have been on strict quotas on almost all steel products.

Suppliers have attempted to keep stocks balanced by "gambling on the purchase of premium material in a market where prices have been advancing from month to month and where international politics have made prices doubly uncertain."

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Stocks Increasing

GOOD LOBSTER YEAR

Fisheries Were Up Both In Volume And Value In 1956

Canadian Press Business Editor - The well-fed Canadian is a problem to fishermen.

He can't be won with an appeal to his hunger, because he isn't hungry. The tidbit from the sea must displace some other attractive and tasty food on his table.

Nevertheless, Canadian fishermen have had a generally good year, with both catch and dollar return substantially higher than in 1955.

LANDINGS INCREASE

To Oct. 31, landings on Atlantic and Pacific coasts totalled 1,801,700,000 pounds, up 307,100,000 pounds from the same period last year, for which the fishermen got \$79,862,400, an increase of \$12,121,000. The full year's figures will be about 10 per cent higher.

Inland fisheries, including the Great Lakes and lakes in Western Canada, added about \$20,000,000. Most of the inland catch is exported and export figures to the end of September totalled \$15,014,000, an increase of \$1,674,000.

The British Columbia salmon catch was smaller but because of good prices, was up in value. About 70 per cent of all fish caught was sold to other countries. About half went to the United States.

Both Canadians and Americans are among the world's smallest fish eaters, consuming only about 14 pounds a person a year, compared with 40 to 50 pounds in the United Kingdom and 90 pounds in Japan.

But Canadian consumption has been gradually going up. Today's 14-pound consumption compares with 11 or 12 pounds five years ago.

If the world is heading into a food shortage, as many believe, demand for fish may really soar.

CONTINUING ASSET

George Clark, federal deputy minister of fisheries says: "We must look to the sea for the increased protein needs of the future. So long as we take care of it and don't over fish it, it is a continuing asset. The good Lord put it there and we don't have to fertilize it or plow it. It cleanses itself and takes care of itself."

On the Atlantic coast this year, Newfoundland salt fish found good markets in Caribbean countries and Spain, Portugal and Italy.

Mechanical drying is replacing the old method of laying fish on flakes or staves - and letting the wind and sun do the job. The Newfoundland fisherman also has a fresh-fish market, made possible by modern filleting and freezing plants.

Newfoundland is the big salt-fish producer, but otherwise developments in the three other Atlantic provinces have followed

Meanwhile, an Italian and a Swedish salvage ship arrived in Port Said to reinforce the salvage fleet.

A trainload of 472 British civilian technicians released from internment arrived in Port Said Friday after being exchanged for 357 Egyptian prisoners. The war office in London said the technicians, employed by contracting firms in the Suez Canal zone, are being sent to Cyprus and may arrive in London during the week-end.

In London the government estimates of Egyptians killed by Anglo-French forces in Port Said climbed to 650 from 1000.

The government statement was based on figures collected by Sir Edwin Herbert, president of the British Law Society.

12 British Salvage Ships And Crews To Aid Suez Clearance

CAIRO (Reuters)—Twelve British salvage ships carrying their own crews but flying the United Nations flag will take part in clearing the Suez Canal, Lt. Gen. Raymond Wheeler, in charge of UN salvage operations, announced Friday.

One French salvage vessel and seven Anglo-French supply ships also will take part in clearing the 103-mile waterway, the retired American general said.

British and French crews will wear civilian clothes and be under the protection of the UN Emergency Force. Wheeler said that a channel has been opened in the canal from Port Said to El Cap - a distance of 25 miles - Two German salvage ships have been sent to El Cap to continue the clearance operations.
