Thrilling Racing Meet At Summerside Saturday

Before a crowd estimated at about 3,000 the finest racing of the year was staged at the Summerside Raceway Saturday night. The weather was ideal for night racing and the large crowd was treated to some exciting challenges down the back stretch, and spine-tingling all-out drives to the wire.

In the first race Sandy Marr was in second position round the last turn but beat the field by more than a length in the stretch. The Robichaud mare was set back to second position, however, for interference on the first turn, and Frisco the Great, the horse finishing second, was declared the dash winner.

Don MacNeill of Summerside, driver of Frisco the Great, won four out of eight dashes on the night's card. He piloted the Frisco horse, Mag, and in two dashes Peter Clegg under the wire in front, Tyndall Semple, veteran Kensington reinsman, won two dashes, and Clayton MacLeod of Truro, after having suffered a leg injury when Buster C took a bad fall in the fourth race, guided Iola Henley under the wire ahead in the two dashes on the featured classified card. He was presented the Mayor Wedge trophy by his worship for the fastest heat in that class. The Truro mare paced the dashes in 2:10 1-5 and 2:10 2-5. The fastest dash of the night was won by the hobbled pacer, Jo Jo Spencer, who went his second dash in 2:10 flat.

3. Whereas the growing need of having music taught in rural districts and difficulty of securing music teachers presents a big problem, be it resolved that we petition the Dept. of Education to appoint a provincial supervisor of music to assist in getting the teaching of music organized in all schools of the Province.

4. Whereas several rural schools in this area are overcrowded and whereas it is difficult to get a teacher to take a school with over 25 pupils, and whereas teachers for special studies, such as music and art, are hard to obtain, be it resolved that the convention go on record as approving a Regional High School in Kensington.

5. Whereas the Provincial Drama Festival is growing in interest in scope from year to year, and whereas there is now no instruction given in drama, therefore be it resolved that it be recommended that the Provincial Government appoint a Provincial Drama Instructor for the promotion of drama in this Province.

The president introduced Mrs. J. E. Lawson, provincial director of the Canadian Association of Consumers who explained the work of the C.A.C.

Hogan Decides He's Not World's Best Golfer

By JOHN RODERICOK PARIS. (AP)—Ben Hogan took a brief inventory of himself Thursday and decided that he is not the world's best golfer and added he hoped he never would be.

He acknowledged the reams of printed and spoken praise which followed his victory in last week's British Open golf championship in a farewell interview before sailing for the United States.

British and European golfing devotees have described him as about as perfect as a human being can get with a golf club. His feat in winning the Augusta Masters and both the U. S. and British Open titles puts him, they say, among golf's immortals.

"It's real kind of those folks to say so," said Ben. "It's nice to know they have so much confidence and faith in you. But I hope I never become perfect. Because then, where do you go from there? Down, that's where."

There's no magic formula for winning in golf, Ben observed.

"A lot of work and persistence," he said, and added: "Plus a great deal of help from the good Lord."

Ben will be guest of honor at a welcome-home dinner the U. S. Golf Association is throwing in New York July 23. After that, he's heading for a fishing trip in Canada, around the Lake Louise area of Alberta.

"I'm taking my clubs with me," he said. "They go wherever I go."
