TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] The Ice Pack—Steamers and Vessels Icebound. GEORGETOWN, May 7. Capt. Hillman, of schooner Alpin, who arrived from East Point last evening, reports: North and east packed with heavy ice, a bark fast in the ice north of the Point, with sails furled, also a steamer and bark southeast of the Point fast in the ice. The steamer Bonona, Capt. McGoig, of Montreal, is lying at the mouth of Georgetown harbor, unable to proceed on account of ice in the gulf.

"An Irish-American Conviction."

LONDON, May 7. The Times Paris correspondent telegraphs that a convention of Irish-American delegates will soon be held in Paris. The object of the meeting will be to exhaustively consider the Irish question, and to denounce the nefarious operations of the dynamite invincible factions. The convention will endeavor to seek medium ground between the extreme and immoral violence and the constitutional agitation. The new organization, which it is designed to form, will probably be called the "Irish Liberators."

Terrible Marine Disaster.

QUEBEC, May 7. The Steamship Titania, of the Donaldson Line, arrived here at 8.30 to-night with twenty-four persons saved from the Steamship State of Florida. It appears the Florida collided with the barque Ponema in mid-ocean. Both ships sank almost instantly. The number that perished is said to be 150 or 200. The survivors were thirty-five hours in the boats without food or water. The scenes as related by the saved were agonizing, and the escapes hair-breadth ones.

The Short Line Railway.

OTTAWA, May 7. Dr. Norvin Green and Mr. Erastus Wiman are here to sign a contract with the Government for the construction of a portion of the Short Line Railway, from Oxford to New Glasgow and from Canso to Louisbourg. They also propose making application for a contract to construct the road across Maine.

The African Association.

LONDON, May 7. The Times Brussels correspondent says the rumors to the effect that the African International Association will eventually cede its rights to France, are absolutely false. The Association is negotiating for territory as an independent state, and hopes that the great powers will recognize them as America has done.

The Relief of Gordon.

LONDON, May 7. The Standard this morning says it has reason for the belief that the Government will meet the proposal for censure by the official announcement that an expedition will be sent to the relief of General Gordon as soon as the climate will permit.

Fatal Railway Accident.

DECATUR, Ill., May 7. A broken rail, ten miles south of this city, on the St. Louis division of the Wabash Railway, threw a passenger coach and two sleepers into a ditch, injuring fifty people seriously and three fatally.

A Sheriff Shot and Killed.

MEMPHIS, May 7. Wm. D. Harden, ex-Sheriff of Crittenden County, Arkansas, was shot and killed yesterday at Marion, near here, by James Murphy, who was mortally wounded during the melee.

A New Governor.

LONDON, May 7. Shaskin advises say that Major Chermisud has been appointed Governor of that post. He is held in favorable esteem by the natives.

A fair indication of the number of persons who went to Manitoba last year and stayed there is found in a report of the Canadian Pacific Railway made to the Department of Agriculture. The passengers carried during the year 1883 by that railway numbered 61,426, and out of the Province 22,458. Of the latter number, 2,400 were men returning to their homes in the United States who had been employed on a railway work at Port Arthur, and 2,200 on a railway who came over in 1882. Ontario during the past years had immigrant settlers to the following numbers: In 1879, 27,124; in 1880, 23,760; in 1881, 24,979; in 1882, 37,845; and in 1883, 38,542.

Mexico is establishing, by means of subsidies, lines of steamships to Europe, and to another line to run to Japan, China and the Philippine Islands, a concession has been made. Constant vessels, too, are to run, at first without subsidies, but they will have a preference in a contract for the mail service. It looks as if rail and steam were destined to transform Mexico into a more commercial country and change her position among the nations.

Whether American city ladies disdain anything like robust health or not, they seem at any rate to maintain insuperable objections to the exercise of walking, which would do more than anything else to produce such health. A St. Louis gentleman lately determined to test the fact as well as possible by actual experiment. On a certain day, lovely enough, he says, "he was tempted satyrs from their glens," he stationed himself at a point of vantage and watched between the hours of twelve noon and two p. m. The result was as follows:—Going west—86 street cars carried 516 young lady passengers; number walking west during the same time, 138. Going east—86 street cars conveyed 789 young lady passengers; number walking east during the same time, 159. Total figures, 1,305; total walking, 287. These figures included ladies between the apparent ages of 17 and 20 only, and such of them merely as the experimenter deemed to be unmarried.
