Holiday Traffic May Set Record

Warm weather and a sunny sky brought tourists and vacationers out in force over the holiday weekend and figures show that the traffic volume was nearly a record for a July 1 weekend.

Capt. Claude Hunter, although lacking exact figures, described the holiday as "one of the worst yet" for Northumberland Ferries Ltd., who were forced to make two extra trips to accommodate all the vehicles.

He said the rush began at noon on Friday and he expects it to continue to noon today. Many passengers went travelling over the weekend as well he explained but it is the cars that take up the space.

The Canadian National Railway ferries on the Cape Tormentine - Borden run also showed a tremendous volume of traffic.

On Saturday alone 1,092 vehicles crossed from Tormentine to Borden as compared to the summer average of approximately 550 vehicles. Traffic from the island to the mainland was also heavier than normal.

Railway officials report, however, that there were no breakdowns as all three boats were running. Passenger travel was above average as well as the City police had a quiet weekend but the RCMP reported a hectic Saturday with numerous accidents.

Three Cases Are Adjudged In City Police Court Saturday

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney General Ramsey Clark said Monday segregation of privately owned businesses that serve the public is "one of the most onerous and bitter forms of racial discrimination," and asked Congress to outlaw such practices.

Testifying in behalf of a key provision of President Kennedy's Civil Rights Act, the attorney-general told the Senate commerce committee that such discrimination is an insult and humiliation to millions of American citizens.

Dealing with what he called "the immoral logic of bigotry," Kennedy said in a prepared statement.

"White people of whatever kind—even prostitutes, narcotics pushers, Communists or bank robbers—are welcome at establishments which will not admit certain non-white citizens," he said.

Kennedy, generally following the same arguments he presented in testifying on the bill, urged passage of the bill.
