Crew Working To Repair Highway Pavement Breaks

Highways Minister Philip Matheson said Saturday that rain of the past few days has hindered his department's program of road repair, but maintenance crews are out rushing repairs of broken highways.

Reports of serious pavement breaks have come in from several parts of the province.

"Crews are trying to keep highways passable," said Mr. Matheson, "but in some places it is difficult to get suitable material to fill holes. Recent rains have made it hard to get to sand pits."

HOT PATCHING

The minister expects that next week two plants will be in operation to provide asphalt for hot patching. "The road beds have to dry, however, before hot patching can be done," he said.

Mr. Matheson said he expects to make an inspection of highway conditions in the eastern part of the province during the weekend.

Weight restrictions are still in effect on highways. The minister said his department is anxious to lift the restrictions but point-

ed out that rain has left highways in a condition where it is not yet possible to lift the restrictions. "We will take a good look at the situation at the first of next week," he said.

Vehicles are still limited to carrying half of their registered weight.
