

Traps Impounded By Large Ice Foe

Reports from Rustico last night indicated that the large ice foe that had been moving eastward for the past few days stretched from Cape Tryon past Rustico to the Goodhead and Tracadie area.

A resident of Rustico said that as far as the eye could see eastward there was nothing but a solid mass of ice.

In the Rustico Harbor area between 200 and 300 traps were in the water while roughly 4,000 traps were in the Tracadie area. At New London it was estimated that 5,000 traps were set.

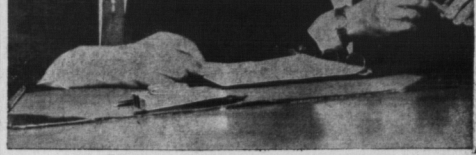
Yesterday the ice was right on the beach in the French River-Crosswater area and was drifting inshore at North Rustico and as far west as Malpeque. None was in sight farther west.

Alberton and Tignish fishermen are reported to have their traps loaded with traps and most of them will head for the French River this morning if the weather is reported, if conditions seem suitable. A few set traps yesterday.

There was no ice in sight at Morell but there were no reports either because of rough seas.

Fishermen along the French River and in the harbor area fear heavy trap losses, as they had many traps out before the ice came ashore.

The combination of ice fields moving inshore and a strong wind from the west made the ice yesterday along the north side of the island but most fishermen were reported in action along the east coast from Georgetown to Beach Point.

Diabetics To Get Cost-Free Drugs

A plan to provide cost-free drugs to diabetics, to go into effect June 1, is announced yesterday by Hon. Hubert McNeill, M.D., minister of health, who said that the cost is \$35,000 a year, it was learned last night.

The administrator of the plan, Charles E. Praught, chief of the provincial health department, said that the cost is calculated on the basis of 500 per cent per year. Diabetics To Get Cost-Free Drugs

This program will remove forever the fear of serious complications which occur in diabetics when they are unable to purchase the drugs required to control the disease," Dr. McNeill said. "As a result, our diabetic patients will enjoy better health and add years of life."

Persons who wish to obtain diabetic drugs and testing materials under the plan will be required to complete an application form on which the attending physician will certify the type and amount of drug required per month.

On the basis of this request, the department of health will issue a card, valid for one year, which will authorize drug grants to supply the drugs and testing materials in the amount prescribed by each patient.
