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By-law amending the By-law respecting Theatres and Public Shows.

Be it enacted by the City Council, of the City of Charlottetown, that section one of the said By-law, be amended by adding the following words:

"Provided never the less, that it shall be lawful for the City Council, upon the application of the owners or managers of any Opera House, Music Hall or other Public Hall of any kind, to grant a yearly license for such sum as may be determined upon, by resolution of said Council.

A By-law Respecting the Sale of Meat.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:

1. Every person publicly selling meat (fresh, salted or corned) by retail within this city in any store, shop, house, warehouse or other building or in the public market building, or in or from any meat wagon, cart, carriage, sleigh or other vehicle upon the public streets or highways of the said City by retail in less quantities than by the carcass, shall obtain from the Mayor thereof a License as a meat Vendor, and the Mayor is hereby authorized to issue such License upon receiving the license fee hereinafter mentioned.

2. The License fee shall be Twenty-five dollars per annum.

3. No person shall expose for sale or publicly sell fresh, salted or corned meat by retail in less quantities than by the carcass in any store, house, shop, warehouse or other building or place or in the public market building, or in or from any meat wagon, cart, carriage, sleigh or other vehicle within the said City, without having first obtained a License therefor in manner above mentioned.

4. Any person or persons guilty of any infraction of any of the Provisions of this By-law, shall, upon conviction before the Stipendiary Magistrate on the oath or affirmation of any credible witness, forfeit and pay at the discretion of the Stipendiary Magistrate a penalty not exceeding the sum of Thirty Dollars for each offence, exclusive of costs, and in default of payment thereof it shall and may be lawful for the said Stipendiary Magistrate to commit the offender to the Common Jail of the County of Queen's County for any period not exceeding thirty days, unless the said penalty and costs be sooner paid. Provided always that nothing in this By-law contained shall be construed to prevent persons from selling meat by the quarter on the public or market square adjoining the market building without such license, but all persons shall have the right thereon to sell meat of all kinds by the quarter on payment of the usual market tolls as at present or at any time hereafter may be provided. And Provided further that nothing herein contained shall be construed to require persons selling tinned or canned meats poultry or game to take out the License above mentioned.

UNITED STATES AND SPAIN.

Latest Developments in the Cuban Situation.

Rome, April 7.—King Humbert received in audience yesterday Baron Fava, who will sail for the United States next Tuesday to resume his duties as Italian ambassador at Washington.

NEWARK, N. J., April 6.—A crowd of men hung General Weyler in effigy at this place last evening. The figure bore the placard "The Butcher, Weyler." It was hung from a telegraph pole in the centre of the business section.

TAMPA, Fla., April 6.—The steamship Olivette sailed tonight for Havana to bring over Americans desirous of coming. This ship has been undergoing repairs and it was with the greatest urgency that she was made ready for the trip.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—The Washington Post summarizes the situation as follows:—

The temporary withholding of President McKinley's message from congress was due to the receipt of a cablegram from Consul General Lee at Havana advising that if the message contemplated armed intervention it be deferred until all Americans in Cuba could leave the Island. He stated that the exodus could be completed by the 10th inst. Members of the foreign affairs committee of the house and senate promptly acquiesced in the opinion of the president and cabinet that the message should be delayed until next Monday.

The utmost confidence is felt by the administration and congress in the wisdom and good judgment of General Lee in any emergency. The rumors of disturbances in Havana are not confirmed but the conditions there are extremely threatening. Consul General Lee will remain at his post until all other Americans are safe. The President's message had only been changed in that it will ask congress to authorize and direct immediate intervention. Otherwise the message will stand as heretofore outlined, and it will be of such a vigorous ringing character as to meet the full expectations of congress and the country. It will inevitably mean war. Hostilities can only be averted by Spain herself declaring the independence of Cuba. Negotiations with Spain have not been reopened by the United States, and will not be. The Queen Regent has not sent a personal message to the president making a new proposal for peace. With the influences now at work through foreign diplomatic channels to bring about a settlement of the difficulties between Spain and her rebellious subjects in Cuba this government has nothing to do. The administration and congress stand pledged to the freedom of Cuba, and will accept no solution that does not involve the withdrawal of Spanish troops from the island and the hauling down of the Spanish flag.

WASHINGTON, April 6.—The navy department yesterday concluded the purchase of four of the ten ships contracted for. The four vessels selected, and which are now the property of the government, are the Morgan line steamers El Roi, El Norte, El Sol, and El Sud. No orders have as yet been sent to the navy authorities at New York as to the disposition of the vessels, but it is expected that the work of preparing them for duty as auxiliary cruisers will begin immediately.

NEW YORK, April 7.—A special to the Times from Washington, says:—The flying squadron, under command of Commodore Schley, will more on the Canaries within 34 or 48 hours. This is the programme of the navy department. It is both a reply to the despatch of the torpedo flotilla and fleet of cruisers toward American shores, and preliminary to a decisive blow at the sea power of Spain. This is the first positive war order issued.

KEY WEST, Fla., April 7.—Conditions here have undergone a decided change within the last 12 hours in consequence of the Washington advices as to Consul General Lee's approaching departure and the attitude of the administration, from his appointment and chagrin that followed yesterday's pacific advices from Madrid. The latest news has aroused the bellicose spirit to a greater degree than ever.

MADRID, April 7 (via Paris).—Fifteen Spanish men-of-war will leave Cadiz immediately for Cape Verde Islands and several battalions have started to reinforce the garrison at the Balaric Islands in the Mediterranean. The provincial militia in the Canary Islands will be placed on a war footing.

EASTER MARKET.

Choice Beef, Lamb, Veal and Hams on Sale To-day.

The display of meat at the market today was large and the quality exceedingly good. The various stalls were well filled with the choicest beef, lamb, veal and hams, and were the cynosure of all eyes.

Blake Bros. stall, the first to meet the eye of the visitor entering by the Queen Street door, looked especially inviting. This firm showed the carcasses of five steers, which had been fed by themselves. The total dressed weight of the five was 4,500 lbs. As regards quality it was agreed that they could not be surpassed in any of the markets of the larger cities, and in few if any of these would they be equalled. So nearly alike were all five that connoisseurs found it impossible to determine which was the better carcass. The price ranged from 12 to 14 cents. This firm also showed a choice spring lamb and other fine meats.

The stall of Saunders & Newsom, at the eastern entrance, was another attractive spot. This firm also had five carcasses of beef, all of which was of the choicest description. These included three choice steers, two years old, which dressed 2095 lbs. and two heifers dressing 1710 lbs. The dressed weight of the Stock Farm heifer was 1000 lbs. The firm also showed a fine spring lamb, besides a quantity of bacon and lard.

Further inside the building the favorable impression formed upon entering was accentuated, for there, as well as in the stalls already mentioned, the quality of the meat on sale was excellent. Henry Balls had four choice carcasses of beef, the dressed weight of which was 3041 lbs. The Bell cow dressed especially well, tipping the scales at 950 lbs. Mr. Balls had also a carcass of veal, and a quantity of hams.

William Sellers also had a good display of beef, his four carcasses tipping the scales at 2516 lbs. Mr. Sellers informed the reporter that he killed nine other carcasses which he shipped to Nova Scotia and Cape Breton for the Easter market.

Thorne Bros. stall was also well filled, their display including five carcasses of excellent beef dressing 3458 lbs, and two choice lambs.

Drake & Sons stall adjoining was also well supplied with excellent meat. They showed four carcasses of beef dressing 2500 lbs, and had two more at their shop which dressed 1400 lbs. They also showed a large quantity of hams.

Reams Jenkins had two carcasses of beef dressing 650 and 690 lbs, respectively, and several choice lambs one of which he sold to the Hotel Davies.

Robert Madlow also had two carcasses of beef, which dressed 1240 lbs.

Stephen Brown had two carcasses of choice beef. The McMillan cow dressed 600 lbs, and the Stock Farm cow 1100 lbs.

Henry Wood's stall contained one carcass of splendid beef. The feeder was William Wood, of Alexandria, and the weight 790.

Pope Mills brought in three good carcasses weighing 1600 lbs.

E. Brown had two carcasses of beef dressing 550 lbs each. The quality was excellent.

The stalls of Messrs. Corish, McNeil and others butchers were also well supplied with good beef.

COURT OF CHANCERY.

APRIL 7th 1895. McEwen vs Davison. Bill filed to enforce a lien. The complainant father devised 60 acres to his eldest son charged with support of son Benjamin who was in delicate health. The testators directed the payment of certain legacies and after the death of his widow the residence of his personal estate was to be divided among such of his children and grand-children as the executors thought needed it most. The eldest son predeceased his father, leaving a widow and six small children who were unable to support Benjamin. The Bill prayed for the enforcement of the law—or in the alternative to allow a sum to be set aside for Benjamin's uncle to take care of him for life.

VICTORIA, B. C., April 7.—The news of the arrival of Jack Carr with advices from balloonist Andre, was telegraphed from Departure Bay upon the arrival of the steamer upon which Carr travelled from St. Michaels. No details were given beyond the fact that Carr had such advices, and nothing further is obtainable until the steamer arrives at Vancouver or Victoria, sometime tonight, as she has already left Departure Bay, which 60 miles from this place.

OTTAWA, April 7.—The annual report of the Minister of Justice was distributed yesterday. It shows the prison population to be 1,382, an increase of 40 over the previous year. The convicts under 20 number 131, and over 60 number 22. There are 57 life prisoners, 10 Chinese and 23 Indians. There are 893 single and 452 married men and seven widowed. As regards social habits 783 are put down as temperate, 475 in temperate and 124 abstainers.

Work has been suspended in all the coal mines of the Ohio district, because the ten per cent increase in wages agreed upon by the miners and mine owners at Columbus and Chicago has not yet been applied to the common laborers in the mines.
