EMPEROR LIVES ON WAR STATUS

TOKYO, June 22 (CP)—Emperor Hirohito has abandoned courtly splendor for a frugal routine because of Japan's war in China. Well-informed newspapers say the mighty ruler has discarded silken raiment for cotton, sold all his gold and jewelry and is engaged in pursuing his hobbies spends his days buried in endless affairs of state. The very watch he consults is a cheap model costing less than 10 cents, about \$2.75. The newspaper Asahi recently described his daily routine as follows: He rises at 7 a.m. At 8 he goes to the museum of his ancestors to pray. He then devotes an hour to studying the newspapers and afterwards, attired in military uniform, takes his morning walk. From mid-morning until 12 p.m. he is engaged in state affairs. Since the war in China began, Asahi said, the emperor has discarded silken and linen underclothes for cotton. He is now wearing glasses as rimmed with celluloid because his gold has been turned over to the Bank of Japan. And he has given up his favorite pastime—biological research. The emperor's automobile is running on a Japanese fuel substitute. The ruler neither smokes nor drinks foreign wines or liquors.

Canada's Trade Grows In Far East

MONTREAL, Que., June 22—"Trade between Canada and the far east is being maintained in fair volume," said L. L. Lawler, general agent of the Canadian National Railways at Singapore, Straits Settlements, now in Montreal on his regular furlough, and while here is reporting to the officials of the Traffic Department relative to matters in which the Canadian National Railways are interested in the far east, India and Ceylon. There is a steady flow to Canada of such commodities as rubber, tea, rice, bannap, vegetable oils, tin and canned pineapple from the territories mentioned, according to Mr. Lawler, in all of which traffic the Canadian National Railways are actively interested. He commented very favorably on the work being done in the far east by the Canadian Trade Commissioner, Mr. C. Butler, and expressed his appreciation of Mr. Butler's activities in developing traffic between Canada and the far east. Relative to the passenger situation, Mr. Lawler notes an increasing number of people travelling from the far east to the United Kingdom on leave, now choose the route across Canada, and that appropriate season, an appreciable number of those travelling via Canada are interested in a stop-over in the Canadian Rockies and take the opportunity of spending a few days at Jasper National Park; the attractions are now becoming quite well known in the Orient and far east. Mr. Lawler was born in Winnipeg, Man., and after a number of years' service in Canada, was transferred to the Oriental organization of the Canadian National Railways seven years ago. Mr. Lawler stated he welcomed visitors from Canada in Singapore. A Canadian Club had recently been formed and Canadian visitors could be assured of a welcome.

STATES POLICY RE PALESTINE

BRITISH COLONIAL SECRETARY MAKES STATEMENT AT GENEVA. JERUSALEM, June 20 (CP)—Bombs thrown through a window in the village of Lusitania, near Tiberias today killed two Arab women. A Meanwhile pleas against terrorism were being made at the opening here of the National Jewish Congress. One Arab injured in a bombing in the Hafia market yesterday died today, bringing the death toll to 19. British troops seized guns and bullets in a subterranean vault in the Jewish colony at Ramatgan, near Tel Aviv.

GENEVA, June 20 (AP)—Malcolm MacDonald, British Colonial Secretary declared today the Arab revolt in Palestine was a "genuine patriotic movement" which Great Britain must respect if she carries out her obligations as the mandate power under the League of Nations mandate.

Here to explain Britain's new Palestine policy to the League of Nations mandate commission, MacDonald broadcast his statement to North America. Reviewing Britain's efforts to preserve a balance between Jew and Arab in the Holy Land, the Colonial Secretary said the Arabs had remained hostile throughout the project of a Jewish national home. Stating the mandate problem "is a riddle" was to prevent Arab from being dominated by Jew and Jew from being dominated by Arab, MacDonald denied Britain's new policy would bring about the latter result. Although Jews make up less than a third of the population, he said, their "strength is out of all proportion to their numbers" and their economic power "decisive."

HITS EMPIRE HUB AS "MUSEUM PIECE"

LONDON, June 22 (CP)—London, in the view of Architect Frank Lloyd Wright, is a museum piece, and as a modern city is "not fit for human habitation." He is from Springfield, Wis. The builder who designed Tokyo's Imperial Hotel, only earthquake proof structure in the city in the 1923 disaster, came here to deliver four lectures in the Sir George Watson Memorial series and left sentimental over London, but condemning it. Said Wright: "Your government is making plans to evacuate the city. Why not evacuate it for good? There is plenty of room on this green earth for everybody. He declared he could build a perfectly earthquake shelter, "but why should I?" "If statement cannot solve the problem at its source, civilization is hardly worth saving. People should be allowed to live above earth—they will be under it soon enough." Wright sat in an old-fashioned hotel, drew designs on the floor with a cane while he talked to newspapermen. He said he liked London's green parks, hated skyscrapers. But "in England I have found the greatest cultural lag outside of Russia and the United States."

PLACE IN PLAN

(By The Canadian Press) LONDON, June 22 (CP)—Seven air ministry has ordered seven autogiro aircraft for export to the Middle East. The planes may be used in districts where landing and take-off space is restricted. The new machines may be flown off an area little bigger than a tennis court and can "jump" vertically between 12 and 16 feet. They can be landed in a corresponding small space. The "hump" take-off is achieved by raising the windmill-like rotor to the vertical. The vanes of the rotor are raised in a horizontal position while they gain speed and are sent spinning like feathered cars. The rotor is turning at 2,000 revolutions a minute the vanes are turned to "take hold" of the air and the machine is lifted. The new craft also can be landed without forward motion.
