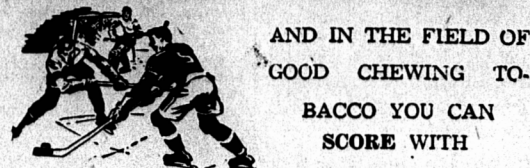

Saint John Scores 4-3 Victory Over St. Mary's

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Feb. 27 — (CP)—Two third period goals gave Saint John Beavers the margin for a 4-3 edge over Halifax St. Mary's in a Maritime Major Hockey League fixture tonight.

Jack Heon, with a brace, Paul Platz and Buck Whitlock were the Saint John scorers. Hughie Campbell shot two for Halifax and assisted Muckle Hollett in the other.

Third place Beavers finished the game 14 points below Halifax, in second place. With the regular league schedule to end here Thursday, the order of standing in the four-team loop cannot be changed.

Whitlock's scoring point advanced his total to 125, or 11 more than his nearest rival, Billy Watson of St. Mary's, who was idle tonight. Both have one more game to play in the regular schedule, with Whitlock virtually certain of leading the league scorers for the third time in four years.

Despite suspension for failure to pay \$10 fines, three players took part in tonight's game. They were Ted Watson of Beavers and Campbell and goalie Eddie A'Aoust of Halifax. Another St. Mary's player, Don McLaughlin, was similarly suspended but did not appear here tonight.

The game was late starting while team managers and officials debated the eligibility of the three players.

The game finally began, however, when payment of the fines from Campbell, D'Aoust and Watson was accepted by E. R. Ingraham, Saint John, vice-president of the league.

Halifax used five players from the Junior St. Mary's.

Bill Ford, of St. Mary's, suffered a facial injury in the second period and was unable to finish the game.

Montague Meteors Win First Game Of King's County Hockey Finals

Montague Meteors won the first game of the King's County intermediate hockey finals last night, defeating Souris 6-4 at the Montague Rink in one of the cleanest games played here this year.

This was perhaps one of the big features of the team, in that although there was considerable body checking, it was done in the open without the usual heavy boarding. The locals fought hard during most of the game, but slackened the pace at the beginning of the second period which almost proved disastrous. However, they soon regained their pace and proceeded to outpace their opponents in fine style which quickly netted the needed goals.

Although the ice was poor they completed most of their long passes, and were on the puck constantly to prevent any breakaways.

The visitors also attacked with vigor during the game, but seemed to lack the ability to capitalize on their chances. It was also noted that the team is composed mainly of young boys, and in another year or two Souris will have a team to be taken into consideration over the island.

During the first period two goals were scored by Clements for the locals, both on long shots which the goalie missed entirely to put Montague on the board two up.

In the second session the locals slowed up, and the Souris squad took advantage to rap in three goals, with S. Paquet getting one and McCormac two. Faced with a deficit of one goal the Meteors pepped up again and within one minute sank two goals to put them one up at the end of the second period with MacLure and Mac-

Lean doing the honours.

Again McCormac for Souris tied the score shortly after the beginning of the third period with his locally famous shot which counted for three goals last night. In order to put themselves ahead a few points in anticipation of the final game in Souris on Friday night, the Meteors put on the gang attack to place Power in position, and on two fine angle shots he deneted the twines twice to give Montague the game 6-4.

Local High School Rink Home From Trip To B.C.

Members of the Prince Edward Island High School championship curling rink returned to Charlottetown last night from Nelson, B. C., where they participated in the Dominion High School competition. The boys won three of their nine games, and performed creditably in all matches.

The trip to the Pacific Coast and back took almost three weeks, and the experience gained, friendships formed will be remembered a lifetime. Mr. Andrew Bagnall, who accompanied the rink, was high in his praise of the manner in which the boys conducted themselves and of the splendid way in which they were treated on the trip and the hospitality extended them in stop-overs.

Mr. Bagnall gives an interesting account of the experiences, which follows:

We left Charlottetown on the morning of Feb. 13 with the party consisting of Frank Acorn, 1st stone; Maurice Jenkins, 2nd stone; Karl Reardon, 3rd stone and Douglas Cameron, skip.

The first day was quiet, and was spent sightseeing, mostly from the train.

After arriving in Montreal at the C. N. R. station, we went and checked our bags, then proceeded to the Forum, the home of the Canadiens hockey team where we were shown many interesting things, including life-sized pictures of famous players.

From there we visited several curling rinks, the last being the Caledonia where the boys were taken on the ice for some practice. The president insisted we stay for dinner, where we met the Nova Scotia rink before returning to the station.

From this time on things began to happen. After a very pleasant trip, we arrived at Winnipeg Friday where we were met by John Cameron of the Winnipeg Free Press; Ken Watson, president of the High School Curling Club; Charles Scrymgeour, secretary of the Club, and Scotty Harper of the Winnipeg Free Press sports staff.

From here we were taken to lunch at the T. Eaton dining hall as guests of the T. Eaton Co.

After lunch we went to the famous Granite Curling Rink where the boys had games with local high school boys and we had dinner as guests of the club. Then we proceeded to the station, where we met some other teams before taking train for Nelson.

Arrive In Nelson

On the way we were joined by the other teams. We arrived in Nelson at 3 P. M. Sunday. Here we were met by what seemed to be the whole town. Led by a pipe band, the teams paraded through the streets to the rink, which is part of an immense building known as Civic Centre. From here we went to the Hume Hotel, our home while in Nelson, where dinner was given by the Nelson Curling Club.

After dinner we were led to the United Church.

Monday morning, the draw being completed, games got underway and after the first round we were taken to lunch at the Columbia River by the Columbia River Curling Club.

Tuesday saw continuation of games and lunch was given by the Kinsmen Club.

The senior members were entertained by Nelson Chamber of Commerce officials.

On Wednesday the games were completed, prizes awarded and the boys visited Nelson High School. Dinner was given at Hume Hotel by the City of Nelson.

Visit Trail

Thursday the entire party left for Trail by bus, as guests of the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. They milked down the Columbia River we passed on our way the Mile Doukhobor settlement, tomb of Peter Verigin, remains of schools and houses burned by these people. Also to be seen were six power dams in a distance of 25 miles.

At Trail we were given lunch by the company, then shown through many of the plant's buildings to see nickel, lead, silver and gold being taken from ore. Also zinc being made with an acid solution.

We were allowed to handle a brick of gold worth \$22,000 and to see a car being loaded with silver which would have a value of \$100,000.

Also being manufactured by the company is fertilizer, which they claim to be their best-paying product, shipping as many as 40 cars per day.

In the evening the boys gave the people of Trail an exhibition of curling. Many comments were made as to the splendid feeling and sportsmanship shown by the boys for each other.

The games were played at the new Civic Centre, an immense building given the City by the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Co. at a cost when completed of almost one million dollars. They have six curling lanes and two more to finish. They also have a large hockey rink, seating four thousand and standing at least two. In addition there are lunch rooms, shower baths and a small rink for children.

We were guests of the Trail Curling Club to dinner, after which we returned to Nelson where we took the train for home, via Calgary.

For morning we were nearing Crow's Nest and saw the mountains in all their beauty.

We passed the town of Frank where we saw the site of the old town that was completely buried some years ago when part of a mountain fell on it.

On our trip through Alberta, via MacLeod and High River, cattle and horses could be seen living on the range as in summer.

Arriving in Calgary we were met by citizens and driven to places of interest, including a newly completed skating rink "which has no equal on the continent," also to the grounds where the Calgary

McGregor Tells Why He Quit Halifax Club

KINGSTON, Ont., Feb. 27 — (CP)—George McGregor said today that "financial difficulty" had caused his sudden departure from Halifax St. Mary's of the Maritime Major Hockey League.

McGregor, highest-paid player on the St. Mary's roster, said a disagreement with club officials over living quarters for his family had led to his quitting, which resulted in an indefinite suspension by the league.

McGregor said he had been promised an apartment on his arrival in Halifax with his wife and baby. When he arrived, there was no apartment available and the McGregors were placed in a hotel. Jimmy MacDonald general manager of the club had promised him the first available apartment. A house had been found for McGregor, but he and the manager had agreed that it was unsuitable.

The player said MacDonald had also promised to look after McGregor's hotel bill but had said later that the club could only pay \$300 of the total.

After considerable delay, McGregor said, he had paid the bill himself and telephoned Don Murphy, assistant general manager, informing him that McGregor would leave unless the matter was settled.

When no word was received from the club McGregor had left Halifax the following day.
