Lidlow, 14, of Encino, Calif., is a newspaper which is in its second year. Circulation is 500 copies, at a yearly subscription price of \$1. The paper is printed in Encino, and is the only newspaper in Encino. Alan calls it the Encino News Correspondent, and he is so called in his own paper.

It is just that! He is the reporter, writer, proofreader, advertising manager, advertising salesman, man, copy boy, editorial writer, editor, and publisher — along with a lot of other duties and jobs. His parents do not help him with it in any way.

"I do all the work myself," says Alan. "and it certainly keeps me busy. Of course, I also go to school. My teachers are all in favor of my getting out the paper; they tell me it is wonderful training for me."

Alan gets a lot of his news by attending meetings of the Chamber of Commerce, conventions, clubs and picnics. He has two photographers working for him, on a 24-hour basis. They usually attend meetings together. When schoolmates hear of an item which would make news for the paper they pass it along to him.

"A lot of my news I get by telephone," explains Editor Lidlow. "Friends call and let me know what is happening to them, their friends, or their neighborhood."

One of Alan's main jobs is selling display advertising. He shows sample copies of his paper to store owners, asking them to place advertisements. When he tells them about the 5,000 circulation, most of them buy space.

"I don't make any money," states Alan. "because my expenses are high. The biggest bill is paying the printer to print the paper. I decide on the entire layout and write all the headlines, but the print shop does the actual printing."

Another expense is the teletype machine, which I rent. It gives news of places and people in and around Los Angeles. I need it because I can use some of the items."

Alan is getting a lot of fun and experience from his newspaper efforts. Because of the paper, he is perhaps the best-known youngster in Encino. People respect and admire him because he is doing such a good job. Even with all his work, Alan has time to hike, play tennis, and go to shows.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—What was the per capita cost of U.S. foreign aid for the year 1956?
A—The aid program for helping other nations took \$23.07 from every American man, woman and child.

Q—How early was the question raised as to who shall determine the inability of the president to discharge his duties?
A—John Dickenson of Delaware raised the question at the Philadelphia Constitutional Convention in 1787. But it was a hot summer, and the delegates went home, leaving the ambiguity to stand.

Q—Who was the first American woman ever presented at the British court?
A—Abigail Adams, wife of President John Adams.

Q—Are rickshaws still the popular mode of travel in Shanghai, China?
A—No, the last two rickshaws in Shanghai, were pulled into a museum in 1956.

Q—By what name is the island of Formosa officially known?
A—The U.S. Department of State officially adopted Taiwan as the name for Formosa. Both Nationalist and Communist China prefer Taiwan, a Chinese word meaning "great bay." The Portuguese named the island Formosa meaning "beautiful."

Q—Is it true that onions and Easter lilies are related plants?
A—Yes, onions, Easter lilies, tulips, garlic and hyacinth all belong to the varied lily family.

Q—Has there ever been an English-born Pope?
A—Only one Englishman, Nicholas Breakspear, has ever been elected Pope. As Adrian IV, he was Pope from 1154 to 1159.

Q—Of what material was the so-called Cardiff Giant made?
A—It was cut from a two-ton block of gypsum. The Cardiff Giant was one of the world's biggest hoaxes.

Q—What was the membership of Congress at the time it moved to Washington, D.C.
A—The House had 106 members, the Senate 32.

Q—What is astrodynamics?
A—The study of the motion of bodies in space.

Q—What "first" occurred in the animal world in 1956?
A—The first gorilla ever known to be born in captivity was born in December, 1956, at the Columbus, Ohio, Zoo.

Q—How many children were born in the White House during the administration of Andrew Jackson?
A—Three children were born to the president's hostess, Emily Donelson, a record to date.

Q—Why are flightless birds called ratites?
A—This scientific designation comes from the Latin word for "raft," because the flightless birds have flat breastbones. Flying birds have a keel on the breastbone to support their flying muscles.

Q—What rank did Maximilian, Emperor of Mexico, hold a birth?
A—Archduke of Austria.

Q—Which is the largest of living fishes?
A—The whale shark.

Q—Which were the first animals to have backbones?
A—Fish.

Q—What flower has been made the floral emblem of Alaska?
A—The Forget-me-not.

Q—Are there any mammals that do not bear their young alive?
A—Yes, there are only two that lay eggs—the spring ant-eater or echidna, and the duckbill platypus.

Q—How early did a police force exist in America?
A—On Aug. 12, 1658, a "Rattle

Watch" of eight men was established in the colony of New Amsterdam, the first police force in America.

Q—What animal bears its young in litters all of one sex?
A—The nine-banded armadillo.

Q—What were the names of Notre Dame's celebrated "Four Horsemen"?
A—Harry Stuhldreher, Don Miller, James Crowley, and Elmer Layden.

Q—Who delivered the longest continuous speech in the history of the U. S. Senate?
A—Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon spoke for 22 hours and 36 minutes on April 25, 1953, against a pending offshore lands bill.

Q—Why was the former British Gold Coast colony so called?
A—The colony, which became independent recently as Ghana, got its original name from the gold it produced as early as the 15th century.

Q—In the recent Hungarian uprising what did a Titoist signify?
Q—What historic ship is being duplicated at Brixham, England?
A—The Mayflower II, a duplicate of the original Mayflower. A band of present-day pilgrims will board her and make voyage to America some time early in 1957.

Q—Why is the Octagon House in Washington, D.C., important historically?
A—After the burning of the White House during the War of

1812, the president established the Octagon House as a temporary executive mansion.

Q—Why does Bolivia no longer have a coastline?
A—A war with Chile ending in 1883, stripped Bolivia of its province on the Pacific, together with the port of Antofagasta.

Q—What famous building was once rebuilt through money obtained from the sale of lottery tickets?
A—Faneuil Hall, Boston, Mass.

Q—How old was George Gershwin when he completed the piano score of his "Rhapsody in Blue"?
A—He was 26.

Q—Why do we say "down to brass tacks" to mean that we are getting to the actual fact?
A—It started with sailing. The reference was to the cleaning of the hull of a ship so thoroughly that the brass-colored bolts on the bottom were exposed.

Q—Is Ellis Island still maintained as an immigration station?
A—No, the U.S. Immigration Service shut down operations on the island Nov. 12, 1954.

Q—What importance is attached to Norse discoveries in North America?
A—They are the first recorded contacts of the white race with this continent.

May 29th, 1957

MEMBERS OF THE ARMED FORCES:

**Charges Liberals Are Using
The Tactics Of Desperation**

LONDON, Ont. (CP)—John Diefenbaker accused the Liberals Thursday of using "tactics of desperation" to get votes from the armed forces.

He used the term in reference to a letter to the services over the signature of Prime Minister St. Laurent and to what he has described as Liberal attempts to convince servicemen a Conservative government would cut their pay.

Mr. Diefenbaker, who disclosed existence of the letter at Liverpool, N. S., last week, said Thursday it was not right for Mr. St. Laurent to solicit votes from the armed forces in this way.

"This is not doing what a prime minister should do to those who are serving this country," the Progressive Conservative leader said. "It has placed them in the position as though they were receiving an order from the prime minister."

The letter was signed simply "Louis S. St. Laurent" and Mr. Diefenbaker said it appeared that Mr. St. Laurent could switch from prime minister one day to "just Louis S. St. Laurent, private citizen, the next day."

Addressing an open air meeting of about 800 persons in a sport stadium here, he said the Liberals are getting scared as the June 10 voting approaches.

"Only a few weeks ago the prime minister thought all he had to do was caress, cuddle and coo but all that is changed now. He finds there are issues to discuss."

**ATTENTION
VOTERS
CANADA ELECTION ACT**

Section 47 (1) Every employee who is a qualified elector shall, while the polls are open on polling day at an election, have three consecutive hours for the purpose of casting his vote; and if the hours of his employment do not allow for such three consecutive hours, his employer shall allow him such additional time for voting as may be necessary to provide the said three consecutive hours; no employer shall make any deduction from the pay of any such employee nor impose upon or exact from him any penalty by reason of his absence from his work during such consecutive hours; the additional time for voting above referred to shall be granted at the convenience of the employer.

(2) This section extends to railway companies and their employees, except such employees as are actually engaged in the running of trains and to whom such time cannot be allowed without interfering with the manning of the trains.

(3) Any employer who, directly or indirectly, refuses, or by intimidation, undue influence, or in any other way, interferes with the granting to any elector of his employment of the consecutive hours of voting, as in this section provided, is guilty of an offence and of an offence against this Act punishable on summary conviction as provided in this Act.
