## Inquest Held In Traffic Death At Central Bedeque

A jury empaneled by Coroner Dr. W.E. Callaghan to inquire into the cause of death of Terrence Leard, six-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Keith Leard of Central Bedeque, after hearing the evidence submitted by witnesses brought in a verdict that the child's death was caused by injuries received when struck by a truck operated by Antony Bernard of Summerside on August 15th, opposite the Central Bedeque School. The verdict attached no blame to the driver and recommended that the present signs near the school be replaced by figure type signs placed 500 yards from the school driveway.

A statement signed by the mother of the child and read by Corporal Chipman of the R.C.M.P. Borden detachment, stated that she had gone to the school to bring the boy home and while waiting for the child to cross the road had seen the Bernard truck coming along the highway. She stated that in her opinion the driver could not have avoided the accident and that he was not driving fast at the time.

Officials estimate that by late afternoon attendance equaled that of the opening day last year.

The number and quality of exhibits are exceptionally good. Records show a very large increase in the number of exhibitors this year.

Those who visited the fair yesterday had excellent opportunity to view the exhibits in leisurely fashion. Judging of all exhibits inside the building was completed yesterday morning and continued through the afternoon. It will be concluded today.

The Elliott Show attracted a large number and the novelty booth was well patronized. A large number of meals were served in the dining hall and the refreshment booths also catered to a fairly large number.

The one for three bacon hogs weighing between 120 and 220 lbs. went to Raymond Shea, for one bacon hog to John Clark of Alma, for a sow under 18 months with litter to Don Schurman and for a sow over eighteen months with litter to Harry Pridham. The judge was Stirling Willis.
