Ice Still Threat In Island Waters

Wednesday's air patrol of ice conditions around the province showed that ice is still a major threat to inshore and offshore operations. Fisheries Minister Leo Rossiter said yesterday. "According to the air patrol, there was no light yesterday to check on the ice rain and limit limited visibility."
GREAT MASS OF ICE
Mr. Rossiter said that while mild southerly winds moved ice off shores in the south - east sector of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, there is still a great mass of ice in the area.
On the eastern shore of the province from Murray Harbor to East Point, open water varied from six to eight miles, broken up by belts of ice, and narrowed in to open water at East Point.
The nearest access to open water along the Cape Breton coast is to eight miles, broken through 12 or more miles of ice, varying from six - tenths to eight - tenths coverage in the area.
Conditions along the north shore of the province, from the National Park area, would be deceiving to fishermen and officials. Open water exists all along the coast, but varying from approximately nine miles off North Lake to 10 to 12 miles off the coast.
Outside this open water, however, a lobe of ice extends all the way from the National Park area to nine miles off Cape Breton. This ice belt varies in width from 12 to 18 miles and covers from four - tenths to eight-tenths of the area.
On the weather conditions pushed ice farther away from the province's coast, but mild winds have moved it much except to widen open water areas.
Steady southwest winds are needed to move the ice crescent away from the eastern end of the province.
Fisheries authorities are also reporting that ice coverage along the north east of the Gulf, near the Strait of Belle Isle.
In the observations light is scheduled for this morning. If weather improves.

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Right To Arbitration Sought By Civil Servants Federation

SUMMERSIDE — Enroute to an Ottawa meeting of the national council of the Civil Service Federation of Canada, Robert Betton of Lot 16, Atlantic regional vice-president, said yesterday that word had been received at the CSF head office in Ottawa that Lucien LaPointe, CSF public relations officer had interviewed Hon. W. Pickersgill, secretary of state, on the matter of arbitration for the federal civil service.
The fundamental right of the civil service to participate in collective negotiations is inadequately met under the present Canadian system, according to the view expressed by Mr. Pickersgill at this meeting, Mr. Betton said.
Mr. Pickersgill, himself a former civil service employee, was granted the right to joint negotiations and arbitration, while at the same time recognizing that the supremacy of parliament means that the right to strike cannot be granted, according to the statement issued by Mr. LaPointe following his meeting with the secretary of state.
Mr. Betton said yesterday that the Mercer report on salaries paid to class three civil servants will be held up for consideration at the Ottawa meeting he will be attending this week, and a statement will be released on his return.
He said that there are over 1,000 civil servants in P.E.I. who are members of the Civil Service Federation of Canada, whose national wide membership exceeds 87,000.

Hospital Disaster Plan Subject Of Discussion

Hospital planning in the event of disasters caused by nuclear war or by natural causes, was the topic of a panel discussion at the annual banquet of the P.E.I. Chapter of the College of General Practitioners at the Charlottetown Curling Club last evening.
Members of the panel were Dr. Paul Cudmore, Dr. John Gillis and Dr. Barton Howatt. Dr. Gillis stated, "The doctors of the province had a dual responsibility in the event of warfare affecting the continent to their families and to their community."
Dr. Cudmore discussed the steps that have been taken on the hospital level to deal with major disasters. Later in the evening the hospitals in Charlottetown will take part in an exercise simulating a disaster where as many as 60 or 70 casualties will have to be treated by the hospital staff. Emergency treatment centres will be set up around the island and medical supplies are to be stock piled at the hospitals.
Dr. Howatt spoke on the roles of the federal and provincial governments in the event of such disasters.
Dr. Kent Ellis and Dr. Gillis showed slides of their recent trip to Czechoslovakia and the U.S.S.R. where they attended the International Cancer Research Congress in Moscow. The congress was attended by 6,000 doctors from all over the world, and was held to discuss different ideas and views in the diagnosis of cancer.
They spoke on their travels in two countries and commented on the fact that medical research in the U.S.S.R. has been
