

McGill Is Facing Deficit Of \$3 Million For This Year

MONTREAL (CP) — McGill University faces an operating deficit of \$3,000,000 during the current school-year, says Dr. H. R. Robertson, principal and vice-chancellor.

This financial crisis had its immediate origins last February with the publication of the provincial government's budget estimates," he said in a report to the university's faculty.

"It is on public record that in the estimates, McGill, Quebec's largest university, was awarded an increase in its operating grant of \$98,000—against an increase of nearly \$9,000,000 distributed among the other universities in Quebec."

The government's February announcement created a storm of protest from McGill. The university, granted a charter in 1821, said the \$7,612,000 budgeted for 1966-67 was wholly insufficient.

The French-language University of Montreal was granted \$16,007,000 in the same estimates, an increase of \$3,205,000 over its 1965-66 grant of \$13,492,000.

When the former Liberal government announced its estimates Paul Gerin-Lajoie, then minister of education, referred to other sources of income for McGill such as grants from industry and private interests.

Dr. Robertson said at the time the money, much of it from the National Research Council, is for research. Little, if any, found its way into operations budgets.

OTTAWA (CP) — The Canadian Coat of Arms is featured on Christmas cards being sent out this year by Prime Minister Pearson and Opposition Leader Diefenbaker.

The prime minister and Mrs. Pearson have a small red Coat of Arms embossed on the cover of their cards. Inside is a color photo of the Pearsons taken at the official residence at 24 Sussex Drive and a simple message: A Merry Christmas and below that Bonne et Heureuse Annee.

Maple trees in autumn foliage and the Maple Leaf flag are in the background of the Pearsons' picture.

Mr. and Mrs. Diefenbaker have a plain white card with the Coat of Arms embossed in gold in the lower right-hand corner of the cover.

Inside is an engraved picture of the Diefenbakers standing in the hallway of Stornoway, their Ottawa home. Behind them is a painting showing Alberta wheatfields. It was a gift from the Alberta Progressive Conservative Association.

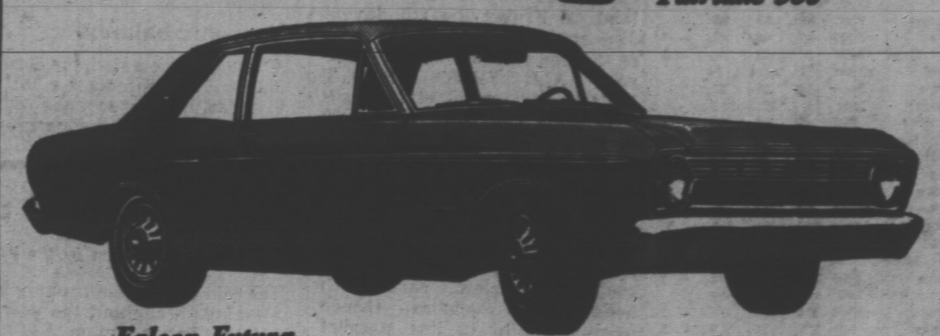
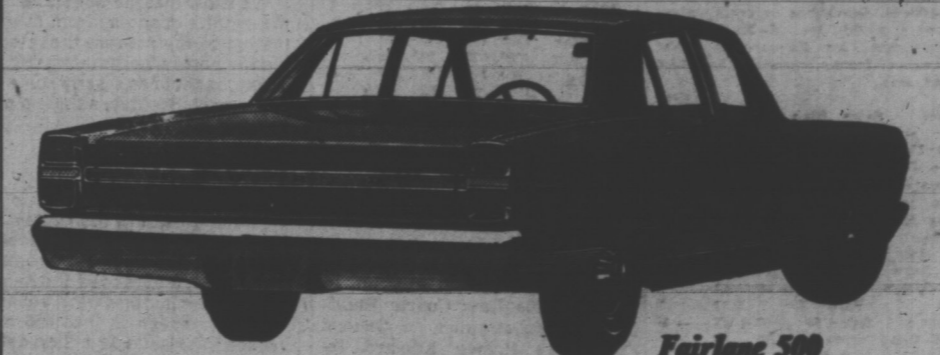
