Dr. Wilder Penfield, Montreal Neuro-surgeon, will deliver the Samuel Robertson Memorial Lecture of 1958-59 at Prince of Wales College this October. The announcement was made yesterday by Dr. Frank MacKinnon, Principal of the College. Dr. Penfield will be accompanied to the province by Mrs. Penfield.

Dr. Penfield, as director of Montreal's Neurological Institute, has earned a worldwide reputation as one of the great medical figures of his time. He has made many contributions to medical science and has received numerous honours from many countries including the Order of Merit from King George VI. He recently chaired Canada's National Conference on Education.

"Learn to do by doing" was the motto brought out by David Pearson, Director of Field Work with the P. E. I. Department of Agriculture in his opening remarks at the Queens County 4-H Club Rally. The rally was held in Prince of Wales College Auditorium yesterday. 350 4-H'ers from Queens County assembled for their first rally which was under the chairmanship of Miss Janet Jones of Alexandria and District 4-H Calf Club.

The morning portion of the program included variety numbers and a Junior public speaking competition which was won by Thelma Cudmore, a member of the North Milton Garment Club with Carol Dickenson, a member of the New Glasgow Calf Club placing second.

The afternoon portion of the program started away with Dr. George Fisher, Director of Veterinary Service, leading the members in an hour of square dancing. The chairman for the afternoon program, Miss Myrna Coles, North Milton 4-H Garment Club, called the group together and after a few variety numbers, introduced the Public Speaking

chairman, Eugene Donahue, Cornwall who introduced the different public speaking contestants.

This competition was one of the highlights of the afternoon program. The judges, Mrs. David Mutch, Agricultural Convenor of the P.E.I.W.I.; Miss Theresa MacLeod, Director of Women's Work; and Mr. Frank Gaudet, Director of Forestry Division decided Miss Frances Hill of the Dunstaffnage - Frenchfort - East Royalty 4-H Calf Club to be the winner of the overall competition.
