Geological Exploration Of Province Is Outlined

Commenting on a recent announcement from Ottawa that drilling will be carried out in Prince Edward Island this winter to see whether or not further exploration should be carried out in a search for oil, provincial geological officer Graham Rogers said yesterday that since geological explorations began in the province in 1953 each discovery "led to another." Mr. Rogers said that in 1953 geological work in the province began in earnest when the federal department of mines and technical surveys co-operated with the provincial department of industry and natural resources in carrying out geological surveys. "The first effort," said Mr. Rogers, "was a surface study which dealt with outcroppings, formations that were visible above ground. Next step was an aerial magnetometer survey which showed contours of the land and visible outcroppings. This led to a gravity survey which, based on the pull of the earth, showed magnetic properties of underground formations. Following this, seismicograph surveys were carried out in this survey, density of underground formations were determined. Then came drilling in which hard cores were brought up for analysis. This winter's work will again feature drilling and may lead to further exploration for oil

Prison Farm Plan Being Considered

Attorney General Melvin McQuaid said yesterday that he will meet this week with department of public works engineer John Gilmore to discuss setting up a prison farm in the province. The discussion will centre around the adaptability of plans of a British Columbia prison farm to a site in this province. Some time ago Mr. McQuaid

got a set of plans of a prison farm located in Agassiz, B.C., and the plans were sent to the department of public works to see how well they could be fitted into an island site. Mr. McQuaid indicated yesterday that "if the treasury board will allow it," he will put a provision in the estimates of his department for the coming fiscal year to allow for the construction of the prison farm. The attorney-general said that he has no site in mind for the institution, nor could he say what the prison farm might cost. Mr. McQuaid said that no further thought has been given to a proposed government liquor store to be built in Charlottetown, since the government decided not to build it on the corner of Kent and Edward Streets. **MAY NEED CHANGE** "Plans were drawn up to fit the Kent and Edward Street
