IN MEMORIAM

MRS. JOHN A. FRASER

The death occurred at the Souris Hospital on August 19, 1936, after a long illness of Mrs. John A. Fraser of Munn's Road, at the age of 97 years.

The deceased was born at Albion Cross, P. E. I., a daughter of the late Lauchlin and Elizabeth Matheson, pioneers from Scotland.

Her husband the late John A. Fraser died in November 1948 and her son-in-law, who resided with her, the late Calvin Kennedy's death preceded Mr. Fraser's earlier in 1948, this making the third bereavement in the family within a few months.

There are left to cherish the memory of a loving mother, two daughters Beatrice (Mrs. Tyler B. Ching) Black Pond and Mrs. Elsie Kennedy now at Black Pond.

Mrs. Fraser had not been in robust health for a number of years but bore her suffering with great christian faith and resignation during her long and painful illness in the hospital she maintained her usual patience, accepting her cross with calm resignation.

She died as she lived at peace with the world and her Creator. She expressed the wish so often to relatives and friends who visited her that she might soon be called to her heavenly home where at last her sufferings would be at an end.

On Friday, August 4th, a short funeral service was held at the home of her daughter Mrs. Ching thence to the Baptist Church, Kingsboro, where a large concourse of friends assembled to pay final tribute to one beloved by all.

The services were conducted by Rev. H. R. Bell her pastor who visited her so often at her home and later at the hospital. The pallbearers were Clarence Ching, Lloyd Kennedy, Bernard Massey, Edwin Fraser, Clinton Stewart and Alvah Ching.

Funeral was under the direction of Sterling Dingswell, undertaker, Souris. She was laid to rest in the Kingsboro Cemetery beside her husband.

He never parted with any until he had developed it to a point where he was as good as it could be made.

In 1880, Burbank began crossing blackberries. At the end of four years he had sixty hybrids, the first ever produced. From hybrid seeds of the third generation, he grew black, red and yellow raspberries, white black and pink blackberries, widely varied in size, quality and flavor.

He found in the eastern states a bramble with an insignificant culture and the result was a combination of the white color with the excellent qualities of the other parent.

Another instance of his genius is the endless apple. Plums next came under his attention. One of his favorite plums is a combination of seven distinct parents, some American, some Japanese. It is impossible to estimate what Burbank's development of this fruit meant to California.

By 1904, the plum and prune crop of the state amounted to 65,000,000 pounds. Indeed, the success of the industry dates from the introduction of the Burbank plum. As the result of his labors, in this field alone, several thousand new plums and prune combinations came into the world, plums that will grow in other dry or wet climates. From 600 varieties of his new plum, he has removed the pit or stone. Think of it!

To Mr. Burbank goes the credit of having produced the spineless cactus. He converted the cactus into a food plant for man and animals, and finally accomplished a task which doubtless will rank among the greatest achievements of all time because of its prospective influence upon economic conditions in semi-arid lands.

In developing the cactus, Burbank first removed the thorns. Then by patient development, converted a worthless plant into a food producer. He is said to combine the flavor of the pear and the banana and realizes a price equal to oranges. One of Burbank's cactus plants will produce, under favorable conditions, 90 tons of food to the acre. From one acre \$35 worth of denatured alcohol can be produced.

All this and more is the result of one man's patient toil and tears, the Massachusetts boy who settled in a rose-covered cottage in Santa Rosa, California.

When moved in this garden and are now healthy and beautiful. Rosy pink fragrant flowers on the Oleander planted near the attic fence in a sunny corner in the shelter of the house is reward enough for the extra care this tender shrub needs in our climate; this ally was given to me by a neighbour some years ago and it is wintered in the house cellar and every year has delighted me with a few fragrant blooms. Four months of colorful bloom is something to be thankful for in the garden and this is the record of the Violas planted in May as a ground cover for the Tulips and continuing as an edging for the annuals. Today I trimmed the old plants of their seed and this will be sown to assure me of many new plants for early Spring, and many blooms remain to carry the planting scheme through the season. Gladiolus and other lovely flowers were enjoyed at the Fair and this garden island is becoming garden conscious by all the signs, the beautiful gardens we see as we drive through the country and the cities...

could produce, hardly enough to pay for their labor. Once Burbank began his experiments in crossing and developing he was, at the end of four years, able to produce a spud so much improved in size and quality that an eastern seed house gave him \$125 for the sole right to use and produce the better variety.

This is where the Burbank potato came into the picture. At once this variety began to yield from 400 to 500 bushels to the acre. The U.S.A. Dept. of Agriculture, in a bulletin issued at that time, gives credit to the plant breeder for adding \$17,000,000 annually to the agricultural output of the country, due solely to the development of the Burbank spud.

Thus encouraged, young Burbank headed for California determined to devote the rest of his life to plant breeding. He chose California on account of its mild climate. However, he soon fell upon evil days and for a time he was obliged to seek work of every description in order to live. This set-back did not discourage the young plant breeder from following the path he had chosen, and ten years later, he started an experimental farm aided by a \$10,000 a year grant from the Government to assist him in his valuable investigations.

Soon his fame spread like a prairie fire and horticulturist and seed houses now clamoured with each other to secure from Burbank his wonder specimens. But for next year that I hear from garden lovers. Gladiolus are the finest cut flower and it is a happy day when the first spike is cut from the tall plants in the fields. Perennials were tucked in the bright color borders and will give bright color where most needed to follow some perennial that is through for this year.

Henry Lily is in bloom in the center bed with the bird-bath, it is a splendid garden plant, vigorous in its growth and falling very seldom, with flowers of a deep rich orange yellow and fine foliage. All Lilies require shade at the roots, and a perennial border is a suitable place for them providing they are not smothered out with too vigorous growing plants.

Tigridias, the Shellflowers of Mexico or Tiger Flowers, are now blooming in the rock-garden and every morning it is a delight to see the new flowers, no flower is so gorgeously colored or so beautiful although they only last one day. They come in vivid red and flame shades, as well as pinks, whites, yellows, many with brilliant contrasting spots or softer-colored centres. These flowers are fleeting, but they keep coming for months on end.

The Hybrid Tea-Roses are doing very well this summer and many new blooms still make the garden look like a rose-garden fragrant and lovely. Dainty Bess in apple blossom pink with the single bloom and golden stamens is growing into a larger bush and with more flowers, it is one of my favorite roses and it has lived in this garden for a dozen years. Hybrid Teas are a bit different in this climate. A beautiful field of wheat is to the south of this garden and it is a lovely sight.

The little cures that fretted me, I lost them yesterday. Among the fields above the sea, Among the winds at play: Among the lowing of the herds, The rustling of the trees, Among the singing of the birds, The humming of the bees, The foolish fears of what may happen I cast them all away Among the clover scented grass, Among the new-mown hay, Among the husking of the corn Where drowsy poppies nod, Where ill thoughts die and good are born, Out in the fields with God. - E.
