School Opening Announced

The newly constructed Colonel Gray Senior High School located on Spring Park Road will be ready for use when the fall term opens next month, it was announced yesterday.

The new 30-classroom high school was planned by the School Board when the announcement came that Prince of Wales College was to have university status. This meant Grades 11 and 12, formerly taught at the college, would have to find new quarters.

Following location of the site construction was started last November and is expected to be completed on schedule shortly. The new school will offer many features never before obtainable in city schools. Among them will be a school library, guidance counselling facilities, a language laboratory, facilities for commercial studies, lecture theatre, home economics, laboratories for chemistry, biology and physics and a museum.

The classrooms are located in the north and south wings with the laboratories and administration offices in the centre section. Construction cost of the building was approximately \$1,050,000 and it was erected by Schurman Construction Company. Architect for the big project was Alfred J. Hennessey.
