

# Beavers Rally To Gain 5-5 Tie With Saints

HALIFAX, March 6 (CP)—Saint John Beavers popped in a pair of third period goals to gain a 5-5 tie with Halifax St. Mary's in a Maritime Major Hockey League game tonight.

The split of points made little difference in the standing. Beavers have already clinched first place and Halifax remained in second though Charlottetown Islanders sliced a point off Saints second-place margin.

Beavers, outplayed in all three periods and outshot almost two to one, came from behind twice in the third to earn the tie. They held a 2-1 lead at the end of the first and 2-2 seconds after the middle frame got under way, they made it 3-1.

But by the seven minute mark of the period, Halifax fired three unanswered goals and finished the second with a 4-3 margin. In the third, Beavers tied it early but Billy Warwick shot Halifax ahead again. Mulligan knotted it for the last time at 7:12.

While they were flying on the attack and giving Saint John goalie Hal Gordon a hot time, Saints were loose defensively. Three of the Saint John tallies were registered when Saints failed to mark their man and one was deflected past Strachan by a teammate. Halifax also had a gift goal when Billy Watson's shot from centre bounced in off Gordon's pads.

Johnny Morrow drew a match penalty in the third when he shot the puck at referee Larry Heffering and cut the official's head. Heffering was forced to retire while two stitches were taken in the cut. The official ruled with an iron hand last night. Twice, when Saint John players questioned his judgement, they were tagged with misconducts.

## IN THIS CORNER

According to the record books Ray Frederick did not obtain a shutout last night but if even a goaltender deserved one it was impossible to see the goal line and thus impossible to express an opinion of whether or not the puck went over when Glace Bay obtained their disputed goal.

Those who were standing behind the net and sitting directly above it were of the opinion that the puck did not go in the net. Several observers who were on the spot said the puck stopped right on the line. Goal judge Charlie Ryan, however, thought otherwise and referee Jackie Kane, who was standing just back of the goal line towards the right hand corner also signalled that it was a goal.

But there was one thing they couldn't take away from Frederick last night and that was his goalkeeping display. The former Chicoutimi ace was at his best and was working hard for that shutout. In the first period he kept the Islanders together and enabled them to survive a furious Glace Bay attack. After that the Islanders started to roll and with Walter Pawlyshyn going a storm there was no stopping them.

Pawlyshyn's four goal outburst last night was, we believe, the greatest one man scoring display in a single game in the M.M.H.L. this season. Twice Pawlyshyn came within a fraction of an inch of adding another goal to his total when he struck the goal post. His every rush up the ice was a dangerous last night and many of them brought the crowd to their feet. His four goals raises his total for the season to 38, nine less than the leader Jim Anderson of Glace Bay.

Phil Vitale had four X-rays taken of his injured foot yesterday and the X-rays revealed that the big defenceman was suffering from a badly bruised instep. Vitale spent most of the day yesterday soaking the injured limb in hot and cold water. He was unable to put much weight on the foot but expects that it will be healed enough to allow him to play either tonight or tomorrow night. Phil blocked a hard shot with his foot Wednesday night against Glace Bay, claimed that it felt like a hammer striking him.

In the baseball world the experts are beginning to claim that the New York Yankees have come up with another "sleeper". Such a player is known as a fellow who has been picked up through some obscure draft or trade and turns out to be a star. In the most recent case of the Yankees the "sleeper" may be known as Jim MacDonald, a young right hander from Modesto, California.

MacDonald came to the Bronx Bombers in a deal for Clint Courtney during the winter. Courtney is a young catcher, who spent last year with Kansas City and who has been rated very highly by no less an authority than Rogers Hornsby. MacDonald, at the moment is the only player that the Yankees have obtained through a trade during the winter.

To many it will come as a surprise that the Yanks could get so much talent from the Browns for outside of Ned Garver the Browns can boast of few major league players. However in MacDonald they have picked up a 25 year old hurler who has been pitching in the minors since 1945. At no time in his minor league career has the young right hander's work fallen below a .500 mark.

MacDonald opened last season with the Louisville Colonels, won ten and lost seven and was sent to the Browns. With St. Louis he won four and lost seven and during the last month of the schedule spent most of his time in the bullpen working for Ned Garver. Two of the young fellow's four victories were over the Yankees, another was a three-hitter against the Red Sox and the fourth was against the Cleveland Indians. Reportedly MacDonald has good control, a fair curve and a "sneaky fast" ball along with an effective sinker.

Prince Edward Island, with only one win in seven games, had a bye this afternoon. Quebec had the bye on the night round.

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# Pawlyshyn Shows Way As Islanders Score 6-1 Triumph Over Miners

The Charlottetown Islanders led by Walter Pawlyshyn and the goaltending of Ray Frederick along with an outstanding performance by all team members roared to a 6-1 victory over the Glace Bay Miners at the Forum last night.

Pawlyshyn, at his sharpshooting best, fired four goals behind goalie Bob Arnell in one of the finest goal getting exhibitions seen in the M. M. H. L. this season. Three of his goals were scored in the first period and the other in the last. Twice he hit the goal post in bids for the fifth goal.

His first goal resulted from a great play by "Bucko" Traylor who put Walter in the clear. Goal number two was a 30-foot slap shot that glanced off MacKenzie's knee while the Miners were a man short. His third goal came on a pass-out from behind the net by Traylor and his fourth was a wicked 20 foot shot that steamed through Arnell's legs.

But his great performance could not overshadow that of Ray Frederick. The Cat from Chicoutimi lost his shutout in the most miserable fashion imaginable. The puck came out from behind the net, struck a stick and squeezed through Frederick's legs.

The disc was barely moving and had only come to a stop when the red light flashed. Frederick grabbed the puck and he along with his team-mates, and fans in the southern end protested that the puck had never crossed the line.

Long after the game fans who were standing behind the net swore that it wasn't legal goal but the officials ruled otherwise. In the record books it counts and it broke one of the finest bids for a shutout that has been staged in the Forum for quite a while.

The 6-1 score did not indicate the closeness of the play. The Miners played on fairly even terms with the Islanders but Frederick in the net spelled the difference. Ray made 28 stops against 29 by his opponent Bob Arnell in the other end.

The Islanders displayed their finest form of recent weeks. George McLagan played one of his best defensive games as the Toronto born player blocked rush after rush. "Bucko" Traylor and "Red" Favero showed returns to their old time form.

Jimmy MacKenzie snafu "Hub" Beaudry shot the Islanders other goals. MacKenzie's was a close-in affair with Gray and Whitlock gaining assists. Beaudry batted his own rebound through Arnell's legs with assists going to Willie Marshall and George McLagan.

Hard-working Bob Leger received credit for the Miners goal. Leger carried the puck over the blue line and around behind the net. In a scramble behind the goal the puck came out and the goal resulted. Cagney Pete Wywrot and the hard-hit Len Haley drew assists.

As a result of the win the Islanders move to within four points of the second place Halifax Saints. The Miners are in fourth place, seven points behind the Islanders and three ahead of Moncton Hawks.

The game, typical of the Islanders-Glace Bay tussels, was one of the best seen here in recent weeks. It was late getting underway as the result of the School Sports but the good sized crowd who disregarded the late hour were well rewarded for their wait.
