

Senators Stop Red Sox; Athletics Blank Tigers

Castoff players are continually leaving the team that gave them the heave-ho, and Faye Hroneberry lived up to expectations in Boston's Fenway Park Wednesday.

Playing in right field for Washington Senators, the ex-Boston slugger, leaped into the Sox bullpen to spear pinch-hitter Lou Berberet's three-run homer bid for the final out.

The spectacular play saved a 3-0 Washington victory.

In other American League action, New York stopped Baltimore 4-1 and Detroit Tigers blanked Kansas City Athletics 0-0.

In the National League, San Francisco Giants rallied to top Chicago Cubs 5-2 behind the nine-inning pitching of Stu Miller.

CLIMAX IN BOSTON
The climax in Boston came with two men on base and two

out in the bottom of the ninth. Pitcher Murray Wall was scheduled to come to the plate, but the sign came for Berberet, a southpaw swinger, to pinch-hit. He blasted a drive deep to right center.

Throneberry raced over, braced his back against the low bullpen barrier, and reached in to pull down the ball.

Earlier in the same inning, Ted Williams clicked for his 13th homer.

At Baltimore, rookie Zack Monroe, a promising pitcher up from Denver, made his first start as a Yankee a masterful one, limiting the Orioles to five hits.

Monroe's performance overshadowed teammate Hank Bauer's hitting splurge that included four singles and a double in five trips.

4-HIT SHUTOUT
Jim Bunning, the Tiger's ace, allowed the Athletics just four

scattered hits in chalking up the 5-0 Detroit whitewash. Boston trailed 5-3.

Gail Harris' sixth home run gave Bunning all the support he needed.

Homers by Ray Jablonski and Bob Schmidt rallied the Giants in the sixth inning of their National League encounter with the Cubs.

Winning pitcher Stu Miller yielded two singles in the ninth with two out and Johnny Antonelli was rushed in to face pinch-hitter Jim Bolger. Bolger flied out to center to end the game.

The Cubs were ahead 2-1 until the Giants teed off on loser Dick Drott in the sixth.

Willie Mays padded the score in the seventh with his only hit of the game—home run No. 16.

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Brooks Lawrence bested Joey Jay in an air-tight battle of right-handers Wednesday night as Cincinnati

blanked Milwaukee Braves 1-0.

Lawrence, whose brilliant shut-out gave him a 6-3 mark for the season, held the National League leaders to only four hits, all singles, as he snapped their four-game winning streak. He yielded only one hit after the third inning.

Gus Bell drove in the lone tally of the game with a sacrifice fly in the third. Johnny Temple doubled, moved to third on Jerry Lonch's grounder and scored on Bell's long fly to center.

The Braves' most serious threat came in the second when they loaded the bases on Joe Adcock's single, a sacrifice and two walks. But Lawrence pitched out of trouble by making Red Schoendienst pop up to retire the side.

Aussies Smash Way Into Wimbledon Tennis Finals

LONDON (Reuters)—Australians Ashley Cooper, 21, and Neale Fraser, 24, battled their way into the men's singles final of the Wimbledon tennis championships Wednesday.

Cooper—the pre-tournament favorite and Australian champion, reached the finals for the second successive year when he defeated fellow Australian Mervyn Rose 7-9, 6-2, 6-3.

Left-handed Fraser beat Kurt Nielsen of Denmark 6-4, 6-4, 17-19, 6-4.

The 30-year-old Dane, finalists in 1953 and 1955, fought to stay in the match for nearly three hours, but the tall Australian's greater variety of strokes proved decisive.

Though Rose, 28, had won the Italian and French titles this year and had gone through five

rounds at Wimbledon without yielding a set, he could not counter Cooper's all-round power.

Cooper, who lost to Lew Hoad in the 1957 finals, blasted his way through to the final round Wednesday in an hour and 22 minutes.

BULLET-FAST RETURNS
Frequently Rose slammed over fast services only to see them hit back with bullet-like speed. Cooper's own service was devastating and he constantly followed it to the net to execute the winning volley or manoeuvre Rose out of position.

Only once did Cooper lose his service—in the 16th game—and that cost him the first set. Only one of his 20 service games was to deuce, and in the second set he conceded only three points of service throughout the set.

Fraser looked set for a comfortable win when he took the first two sets in 45 minutes after forcing the only service break in the fifth game of each set. But the powerful Nielsen began to get his booming first service back with regularity and he extended the Australian to 46 more games.

India's Davis Cup pair, Narayana Kumar and Ramanathan Krishnan, provided the upset of the day by eliminating American defending champions Gardner Mulloy and Budge Patty in the men's doubles.

Canada Meets Cuba Today In Davis Cup Competition

TORONTO (CP)—Canada, with team made up of the players who have dominated Canadian tennis for the last several years, takes on an inexperienced squad from Cuba in Davis Cup play starting today.

Canada, never a world beater in these annual matches for the famed international trophy, is a strong favorite to beat Cuba in his first-round North American zone competition. Only one of the three-man Cuban team has played on grass courts, in Davis Cup competition or outside Cuba previously.

The team of Cuban champion Paul Karmann, 16-year-old high school student Adolfo Mino and playing captain Antonio Diaz, 36, is far from the best squad that could represent the country. The

republic's two top international players, Orlando and Reynaldo Garrido, were left off the squad because of commitments to play in Europe this summer.

CARRIES CUBA'S HOPES
Karmann, a 20-year-old student at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology who was one of the Cuban team members last year when they lost to Venezuela, carries his country's main hopes this time. He will play the opening singles today against Don Fontana of Toronto, Canada's No. 2 ranking player, with Canadian champion Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., meeting Mino, Cuba's junior titleholder, in the second singles immediately afterwards.

The doubles will be played Friday and the two concluding singles Saturday. The draw for the opening singles was held Wednesday

at the Toronto Cricket, Skating and Curling Club where the winner of the Canada-Cuba round also will meet the United States next week.

The players in the first two singles will switch opponents for the concluding singles unless either team has clinched the round after the first three matches. Substitutions can be made for the final day providing the outcome has already been decided.

Both team's playing captains, Lorne Main of Canada and Diaz, are going to wait until after today's matches before naming their doubles selections. Besides Fontana and Bedard, who have parted often and have never been beaten in the last four years by any other Canadians in doubles play, Main can use either himself or Paul Willey of Vancouver.
