Committed To Supreme Court

Jack McClellan, age about 30, of Summerside, was committed for trial in Supreme Court on a charge of theft at the conclusion of his preliminary hearing in Summerside police court yesterday before Magistrate E. H. Strong, Q.C.

Bedeque Power Co. Ltd. Sells To Government

—The Bedeque Power Co. Ltd., a locally owned company that purchases electric power from the town of Summerside and distributes it to 64 customers in an area which includes part of Central Bedeque, Lower Bedeque, Fernwood, Chelton and part of Middleton, is being sold to the Provincial Government and will come under the government's rural electrification scheme. When the transaction is completed the electric energy will be supplied by the Maritime Electric Co. Ltd.

The Bedeque Power Company was organized five years ago on capital borrowed from the Provincial Government. The electric energy supplied through a transformer located at Ross' Corner.

It is expected that the change-over from the Summerside electric lines to Maritime Electric Co. supply will take place within a month when a connecting line has been built between the Maritime Electric Co. line at Trueman's Corner and the Bedeque power lines, a distance of about one mile.

British Plan Overland Trip Across Antarctica

LONDON (Reuters)—Vivian C. Fuchs, British explorer, said Monday that a plan for the first overland trip spanning the Antarctic continent has been under consideration by the British government for some time.

Fuchs, one of the planners of the venture, acknowledged that it would be an expensive proposition involving a trek of 2,000 miles over the roughest type of surface.

He said the expedition as now envisioned, would cross the polar continent from the Weddell sea, southeast of Cape Horn, to the Ross sea. Specially-designed land vehicles would be required to cross the treacherous wastes of the frozen continent.

The 46-year-old geologist, who is equally at home in the whipping gales of the polar seas or the quiet halls of Cambridge, where he has held teaching posts, said the proposal for a joint expedition team was laid before the British and New Zealand governments simultaneously last year.

PREPARE FOR 1955-56

Saying the plan was "as far as we can go at the moment," he added: "If we are not in time to prepare for the southern summer of 1955-56, the expedition can be made in the following year."

In Wellington, Prime Minister Sidney Holland said Monday he knew nothing about the proposed expedition. But Dr. R. A. Fells, president of the New Zealand Antarctic Society, said preliminary details of the proposed expedition were in the hands of both governments.

Despite considerable exploration of the Antarctic since early this century, the continent has never been spanned.
