Father McCormack expressed his thanks and appreciation for the work being done at the centre. The meeting closed with prayer.

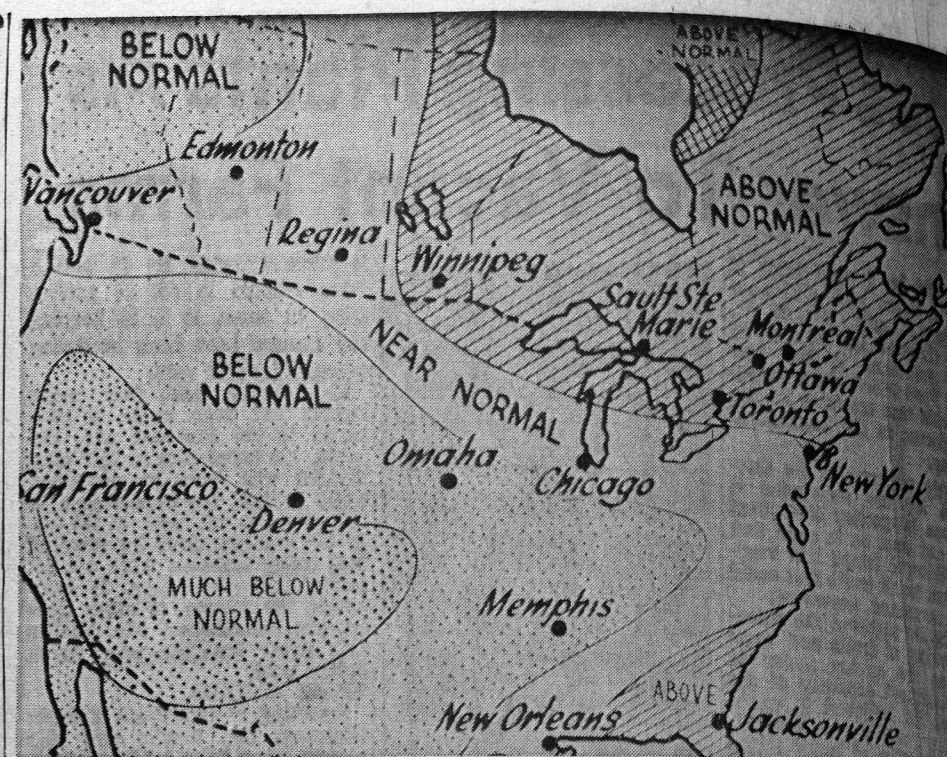
### YORK POINT W. I.
