MONDAY

Following the accident which occurred near midnight on Friday about one mile west of Summerside, two tow trucks were used to separate the truck and car before the bodies of L. A. C. Albert Grant Townsend of Pickering Ont., and Corporal James Albert McRorie of Vancouver, B.C., could be moved from within the wreckage of the car.

A third airman LAC Joseph Raymond Doucette of St. Louis, P. E. I., who was a passenger in the back seat of the car, is in hospital in Halifax and is given a good chance of recovery. In the crash he was thrown to the pavement from where he was removed to the Prince County Hospital and later flown to Halifax. His injuries include a broken leg and multiple head injuries.

MEXICO, Maine, (AP) — John C. Mackinnon, 76, a former state legislator who was elected a Mexico selectman last Monday, died Saturday.

A retired Oxford Paper Co. employee, Mackinnon served in the Maine House and Senate. He was a native of Prince Edward Island.

One of the most serious fires in the history of the village of North Rustico Saturday morning destroyed the modern Stella Maris school and the adjoining hall. For a time residents were afraid the entire village would be lost. The fire was discovered by Rev. Eric Robin, parish priest, shortly after five o'clock, and although help came from Parkdale, Hunter River and Charlottetown, the buildings could not be saved as the flames had made too much headway. The loss is estimated at \$100,000, only partially covered by insurance.

The first P. E. I. Salon of amateur photography that was on display for the past four days in the Harris Memorial Art Gallery, closed Sunday evening after over 500 people viewed the Salon. Requests were received to hold the Salon over for an additional day, however the Charlottetown Camera Club President, Mr. C. Walper said that this was not possible. During his hospitalization, he learned to use self-hypnosis ("You can call it control of the mind") to put himself to sleep when in sharp pain. This practice gave him new confidence to overcome his suffering. Later, when he had to have skin grafted from his leg, he again hypnotized himself so that he did not require anaesthesia and felt no pain at all.

The suggestion that the resolution opposing the transfer of the Wood Islands-Caribou ferry service to the Canadian National Railways or any other Federal agency should be modified if it is adopted by the House was made in the Legislature yesterday afternoon by Hon. W. E. Darby, Attorney-General.

"I think that when we are dealing with any consideration of this kind our actions should be devoted to finding the best methods of obtaining transportation that will be of the greatest benefit to the Province," he stated. "If a resolution of this kind is adopted by this House it should be modified because it is conceivable that if the service is transferred it might be expanded greatly and quickly," the Attorney-General added.

FRIDAY

Television pictures are being clearly received in at least two places in P. E. I. from the newly opened station in Saint John, N.B. It was learned yesterday that a television received installed in Jolley's department store in O'Leary, by Mr. George Matheson, who is in charge of the radio department of that firm, has been receiving pictures from the Saint John station since Tuesday evening.

The receiver is using a temporary 25-foot antenna, while waiting for one of 40 feet in height which has been ordered.

At Ralph Calbeck's general store in Central Bebede, the manager of the radio department, Mr. Arthur Murray, last evening completed alterations to the antenna located on top of the store, and was successful in receiving a continuous and good clear picture.

QUEBEC, (CP)—Robert Hosie of CKRM, Saskatoon, said Tuesday he regarded as a high honor award to the Col. Keith Rogers memorial to a member of his radio station staff.

The award, in memorial of the late Col. Rogers of Charlottetown, a pioneer in the technical advance from telegraphy to television, was made Tuesday night during the annual dinner of the 29th annual meeting of the Canadian Association of Radio and Television Broadcasters to William D. Forst "a recognition of his pioneering efforts in the field of unattended operation of broadcast transmitters."

Premier A. W. Matheson yesterday afternoon asked the members of the Legislature not to pass any resolution regarding the Wood Islands-Caribou ferry service unless the members were unanimous in their opinions about the contents and meaning of the resolution.

"I don't feel we should adopt or amend such a resolution without giving it some very mature thought," stated the Premier. He asked the House to adjourn the debate on the resolution until Monday so that the members would have a further chance to think the matter over and see if they

could arrive at some conclusion agreeable to all.

A bit more fire was shown in the Education Committee meeting yesterday with practically all members snapping questions at Dr. Frank MacKinnon, Principal of Prince of Wales College, who was testifying for the second successive day. The seven-man committee is headed as chairman by Hon. Keir Clark, Minister of Education.

That the tempers of some committee members were slightly on edge was shown when Mr. Lorne MacFarland, Fifth Prince, said they were making a mountain out of a molehill. He was satisfied with the way the College was being run and inquired why the committee was asking so many questions. "I think the whole thing is a damn waste of time," he stated. The remarks were greeted with laughter and desk thumping by members of the House present.

All Prince Edward Island school teachers will receive a straight salary increase of \$50.00 next year according to an amendment in the School Act which was given second reading in the Legislature yesterday afternoon. The increase will become effective in July. Education Minister Hon. Keir Clark estimated there are about 720 teachers in the Province and the increase along with the new increments being paid out will cost the Government about \$36,000 next year.

Commander Ken Birtwistle who was recently promoted to that rank and transferred from Halifax to Ottawa has been appointed Deputy Director of Naval Organization with headquarters in the Capital City.

Commander Birtwistle is a son of former Chief of Police Birtwistle and Mrs. Birtwistle of Charlottetown and continued his career with the Royal Canadian Navy following active service in the late war.
