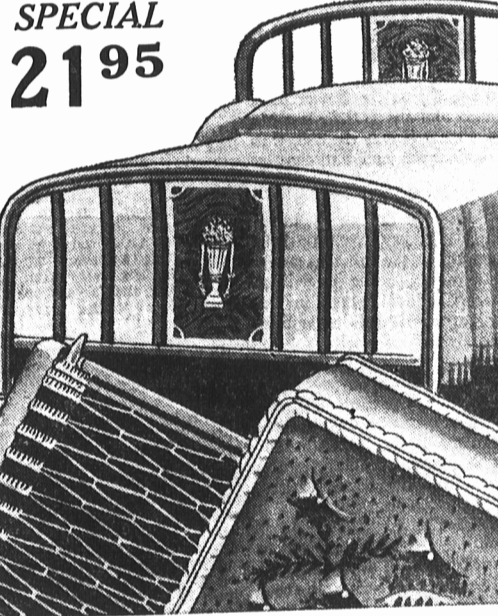

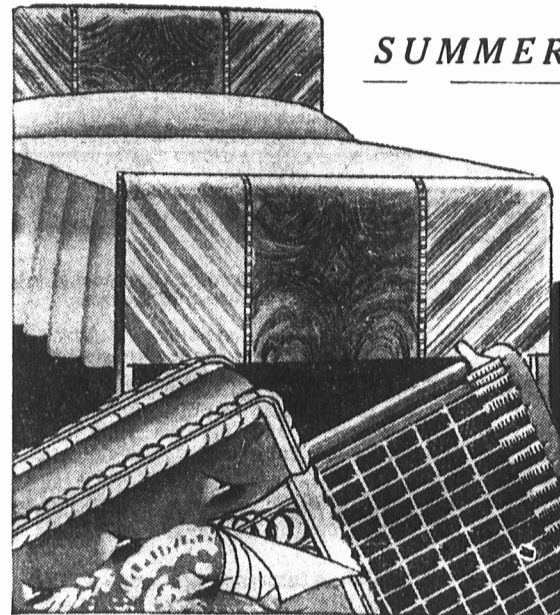

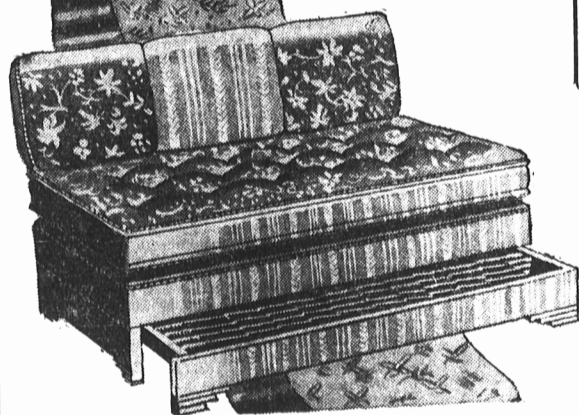

U. S. Attitude Not Revealed

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17—State Department officials indicated tonight that the United States Government's official attitude toward Russia's invasion of Poland would await further advice regarding the implications of the Soviet move. A department spokesman said the note given to United States Ambassador Laurence A. Stenhardt in Moscow and announcing the decision of the Soviet to send troops into Poland had been received here, but that the department, for the time being, had no announcement concerning it.

Reuters News Agency quoted a well informed Washington source as saying: "We may be seeing a renewal of Russia's old revolutionary drive which Pilsudski stopped at the sales of Warsaw and which German and Italian Fascism has claimed throughout all these years, to have been checking. We begin to see the price which Hitler—the so-called bulwark against Bolshevism—has paid. "While Soviet expansion is serious for the democracies, still it cannot be to the advantage of European Fascism either and striking a new balance between Fascism and Communism states may ultimately benefit the democracies." New Fruit Varieties Growth of Years

In considering the question of old and new varieties of fruits, the improvement of fruits through selection of the best wild seedlings has been carried on for centuries by horticultural scientists, and will continue as long as fruit is grown. In recent times, improvement has also been sought by breeding, and

the fact remains that varieties of fruits in use today are far superior in quality to the original wild kinds from whence they came. Mention of new varieties of fruits often provokes the criticism that there are already too many varieties. As a matter of fact, says A.J. Mann, Dominion Experiment Station, Summerland, B.C., the present list of accepted standards varieties is very limited. Furthermore, the quest is not necessarily for more varieties, but for superior varieties. Progress in the fruit industry depends to a large extent on the introduction of the later. Superior varieties may be found on chance seedlings, as in the McIntosh apple and the Elberta peach; or by bud mutation, such as the Red Delicious apple and the Fisher peach; or by controlled

crossing, like Veteran peach and Jubilee apple. Even after a promising seedling or bud mutation is found, it requires years of testing under a wide range of soil, climate and cultural conditions before it can be accepted as a proven standard variety. For instance, it required 50 years to establish the McIntosh apple as a proven commercial product. Therefore, it is imperative that new varieties, even although they have achieved distinction elsewhere, cannot be recommended for planting in commercial volume until given trial under the particular conditions of soil, climate, and culture in the districts intended. A progressive fruit industry comes impatient to try the new sorts. That is quite as it should be, but from the standpoint of the

protection of the grower, trial plantings should be limited and well distributed.
