

**Montreal Police
Head Cleared**

MONTREAL (CP) — J. Albert Langlois says he plans to return to police headquarters today at 1 a.m. AST to resume his duties as director of the Montreal force.

He made the statement at a press conference Thursday a few hours after the Quebec Court of Appeals upheld his appeal from a vice-inquiry judgment which had ordered his dismissal for alleged dereliction of duty.

"I am going back to work tomorrow (Friday) at 10 a.m.," said Mr. Langlois, on leave of absence without pay since the vice inquiry judgment was delivered in 1954. "I have already informed the director of public services of my decision."

BACK IN UNIFORM

"I took a vacation until the court of appeals rendered justice in my case. . . I will report back to duty in uniform."

Pacifique (Pax) Plante has been acting director of police for the last year. He declined to comment on the Appeals Court decision.

"For the present I cannot foresee any changes in my staff," said Mr. Langlois. "Regarding Pax Plante, I do not know what will happen to him. There is one thing certain and that is I will be director of the Montreal police department."

"It is possible that some of my former officers who were discharged or resigned will be reinstated."

Mr. Langlois gave the press conference in the living room of his home in suburban Lachine.
