Chicago Scene Reported Quiet

CHICAGO (AP) — Governor Otto Kerner took a look Sunday at Chicago's riot scene, which he said was quiet. Kerner's trip was coupled with a reduction in the troops patrolling the area where three days of violence and destruction took two lives. The 2,200 guardsmen on patrol Saturday night were pulled off duty at 3 a.m. Maj. Gen. Francis P. Kane, commander of the troops, said the force would be cut to between 1,000 and 1,500 men Sunday night. Kane said the reduction resulted from an apparent return to normal in the area. The remainder of the 4,200 troops called up would be on standby at their armories.

Tignish Anniversary Service

TIGNISH — Rev. David MacDonald was guest preacher at the anniversary service in Tignish United Church Sunday afternoon. The worship was conducted by the minister, Rev. M. Ronald Gazzard, student-assistant. Jack Scott, soloist, sang "In Times Like These."

Auto Companies Sign Contract

HUBBARD, N.S. (CP) — A Halifax businessman thinks he may have struck on an idea to inject more money into the Nova Scotia farming industry and he's gambling \$2,000 on it. E. S. Bringle, who operates an estate planning service in nearby Halifax, is raising rabbits on his property here in an experiment to see whether rabbits can be bred, packed and marketed as "fryers" in Canada. "He says the rabbit fryer industry already is booming in the western United States. If his experiments are successful, it could lead to a new agriculture venture for the province. But he won't be going into the business himself. "I have my own business in Halifax and I'm doing this in my spare time," he said in an interview. "But I'm enjoying it."

W.Prince Men Missing

ALBERTON — Three West Prince County men were reported missing last evening. Frank Gallant, 33, and his brother Freddie Gallant, 44, both of the Coleman area, and David MacLeod of Springhill, in his late twenties, left Summerside on Saturday at 10:30 p.m. in a lobster fishing boat en route to Brae Harbour. They were expected at Brae about five o'clock Sunday morning but at a late hour last night they had not arrived. Atlantic Search and Rescue has been requested to begin a search for the missing men and their twenty-eight foot white boat. Should anyone have information concerning the whereabouts of these men or their craft, he is asked to contact the nearest detachment of the RCMP.

Negro Riot Is Averted

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — An armed robbery in which a Negro policeman wounded a Negro suspect was followed by a riot in San Francisco's Negro Fullmore district early Sunday. Police controlled the outbreak in a short time. They said it was not racial, despite attempts of a few black racists to exploit it. They do not expect more trouble. Negroes set seven fires, all small, with gasoline bombs, police said. Seven Negro youths, including the wounded suspect, were arrested. Police said five suspects in the robbery case were not racial. They said it included a crowd of 200 to 250, police estimated gathered at the robbery scene. Some threatened an off-duty Negro officer, Herman George, who interrupted the robbery and killed Frank Lee Jackson, 21, with a bullet in the chest. George said Jackson had aimed a .22-caliber revolver at him as he ignored repeated orders to drop the gun. Jackson was in the hospital under guard, charged with assault with attempt to murder and suspicion of armed robbery.
