## Sebago Variety Tops Seed Potato Acreage

The Sebago potato continued to dominate the province's seed production picture this year with 7,640 acres passed as foundation, the top grade, and 8,653 acres as certified, it has been learned from Glen Ramsay, district inspector in charge of seed potato certification. This compares with 10,954 foundation and 9,572 1/2 acre year ago when the planted acreage was considerably heavier.

There are 1,907 acres of Kennebec approved as foundation and 2,194 1/2 certified, which compares with 2,277 foundation and 1,130 1/2 certified in 1963. In Irish Cobblers 885 acres were approved this year as foundation and 785 1/2 certified. The respective 1963 figures were 778 and 424 1/2.

In Green Mountains 335 1/2 acres were approved as foundation this year and 379 1/2 certified. Last year it was 290 1/2 foundation and 240 1/2 certified. In Cherokees 138 passed as foundation and 54 1/2 as certified. Last year 205 were foundation and 59 1/2 certified.
