Although it was only the seventh most active issue, General Motors, a market barometer, was the feature of the week. It gained 4 1/2—the most of any of the 10 volume leaders. But the more significant was that the stock set all-time highs in four of the five sessions. GM earnings are due in the next two weeks. Here is the story on the averages for the week: Dow Jones Industrial—up 3.84 to a closing high of 631.33.
